

RULES GIVEN OUT FOR THRIFT ESSAYS

Medal to Be Awarded in District Contest, Cash Prizes in National.

Regulations governing the prize essay contest on "Thrift" as arranged by the National Education Association were today issued by Superintendent of Schools Thurston.

A medal will be awarded to the pupil writing the best essay in the District. The best essays submitted by students in the graded and high schools here will be entered in the national contest, in which cash prizes are offered.

To the high school pupil in the United States writing the best essay, \$50 will be given, to the second and third best, \$25, and to the fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth best, \$10 each.

First prize in the graded school contest is \$25; second prize, \$15; third and fourth, \$10 each, and fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth, \$5 each.

The contest is open to pupils in all schools, elementary, high, public, and private, in the District. Essays should be of less than 1,000 words and written on but one side of the paper.

A non de plume should be used, but the real name, school and grade should be submitted with the essay. All essays must be written and observation of a teacher on Monday, April 12.

Supervising principals and principals of high schools will judge the more worthy essays and submit them to the office of the Assistant Superintendent of Schools by April 9.

WOULD RESTRICT 'NEWSIES' George A. Hall, of New York, Suggests Legislation for District.

More stringent laws to control newsboys were proposed by George A. Hall, secretary of the New York child labor committee, addressing the Monday Evening Club in the Y. M. C. A. last night.

Telling of the evils to which the newsboy is exposed in New York, Mr. Hall asked for new laws in Washington to fix the minimum age for newsboys at fourteen, make the time limit for the appearance of newsboys on the streets at 8 o'clock p. m. instead of 10 o'clock, prevent the entrance into saloons of newsboys and hire a supervising officer under the direction of school officials.

During the period allotted to questions, Judge Milton Strasburger questioned the speaker as to the evils of newsboys as in New York, and Washington boys were not permitted to sell papers without parental permission.
