Drive to Raise \$15,000 to Pay Off Debt on Memorial Hall in Progress.

For instance, Mrs. Story said, one of the candidates was complaining on the issue that the administration was squandering money on statutes without authorization from the congress.

Touching on the purchase of land adjoining Continental Memorial Hall, Mrs. Story contradicted the rumor that any one other than the owner of the property made any profit out of the transaction.

Urging the daughters to pay off the \$15,000 indebtedness on the hall, Mrs. Story asked them to pay no attention to campaigners seeking to prevent the financial activities in order to cheat the administration of glory.
