

TO RUSH ARMY BILL INTO CONFERENCE

House and Senate Committee to Take Up Administration Measure Tomorrow.

The Administration's army bill, authorizing the President to raise by selective draft an army of 1,000,000 men to wage war against Germany, will be sent to conference by the Senate and House tomorrow.

Shortly before midnight both bodies passed substantially similar bills, rejecting the volunteer system. In both Senate and House the Administration victory was sweeping. The army bill finally passed the House by a vote of 337 to 24, with one voting present. The Senate vote was 81 to 4.

In the House the volunteer amendments were rejected on a roll call by a vote of 313 to 109. The chief point at issue between the two houses is the conscription age limit. The Senate bill provides for the calling out of men between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-seven. The House bill would draft men between the ages of twenty-one and forty—all figures being inclusive.

Roosevelt Amendment. The Senate inserted an amendment permitting the President to accept the services of Col. Theodore Roosevelt and his division of volunteers. Such an amendment was defeated in the House on Friday.

Another point of difference relates to the liquor problem. The Harding amendment finally approved by the Senate authorizes the President to make regulations governing the sale of liquors near military camps and to officers and enlisted men. The House consistently refused to write into its bill anything relating to the liquor issue.

In the lower body the army bill went to final passage at 11:40 o'clock last night after nearly twenty hours of debate, and much disorder. Scores of amendments were proposed, but comparatively few were accepted. The comparatively important features in the House bill as passed were:

Features in Bill. Adoption of Kahn amendment striking out all reference to volunteer system and carrying out Administration's program for selective draft.

Approval of Good-Austin amendment, increasing pay of enlisted men during war from \$15 to \$30 per month.

Striking out of \$3,000,000,000 appropriation for expenses of new army. This developed a clash over jurisdiction between the Appropriations and Military Affairs Committees. Chairman Fitzgerald, of the former committee, moved to strike the item from the bill.

Both he and Congressman Sherry explained the Appropriations Committee was preparing a general war budget covering both the army and navy, and contended appropriations made in a systematic, sensible way. The House was with the Appropriations Committee, and only twenty-five members, led by Congressman Sims of Tennessee and Mr. Dent of Alabama, held out for the appropriation as carried in the army bill.

Adoption of amendment by Mr. Hayden of Arizona prohibiting any person from engaging a substitute to do his fighting.

Inclusion in later amendment enumerating persons "engaged in agriculture" as among classes which President may exempt from military duty.

Adoption of Lenroot amendment authorizing exemptions by President "from time to time" so that all classes need not be exempted at once.

Approval of Madden amendment requiring all States to furnish their quota of men, exemptions notwithstanding, so that some States will not become "slackers."

Amendments Rejected. The House voted down many amendments, including one specially stating that members of Congress shall be subject to the military draft. The Keating amendment to exempt those with "conscientious scruples" against war, and the Stephenson amendment to draft not more than 20 per cent of the country's farmers and textile workers were rejected.

Strong opposition to a "young man's war" was shown by the defeat of an amendment by Congressman Miller of Minnesota to draft men between the ages of nineteen and twenty-five—as originally suggested by the War Department. But six members arose in favor of this.

Efforts to raise the maximum age limit to forty-five, fifty, and sixty years were likewise defeated. The principal fight centered all yesterday about the volunteer and conscription plans. When the volunteer advocates were routed most of them voted for the bill on final passage. This number included Speaker Clark, Majority Leader Kitchin, and Miss Jeannette Rankin.

The twenty-four members who stood out to the last against passage of the bill were: Democrats—Burnett, Alabama;

army bill as passed by the House follow: The President is authorized to raise the regular army to its maximum strength of 257,000 men and to organize, officer, and equip it. Similar authority is given to increase the national guard to its maximum strength of approximately 625,000 men. Army and Guard Recruits. Enlistments in the regular army and national guard are to be under existing laws, that is, voluntary enlistments. The President is further authorized to draft into the military service an

additional force of 500,000 men and to provide the necessary officers, line and staff, for the drafted army. At such time as the President may deem proper he is authorized to draft an additional force of 500,000 men—making 1,000,000 men subject to the selective draft. The total armed forces authorized in the bill aggregate approximately 1,500,000 men. All male citizens, and male persons who have declared their intention to become citizens, between the ages of twenty-one and forty years, inclusive, are subject to conscription. Quotas for the several States, Terri-

tories, and the District of Columbia shall be determined in proportion to population. Senate Reverses Itself. The Senate, during the closing hours of the night session, reversed itself on the proposition of making Congress a "bone-dry" organization literally, in so far as serving liquors to any member is concerned, and after numerous speeches and prolonged debate, decided to give to the President power to provide regulations dealing with the liquor question at camps and about military reservations by a vote of 81 to 33. Four hours were spent in debating

the liquor question, during which time it was variously suggested that army and navy officers and men, Senators and Congressmen, and all persons on the pay roll of the United States Government, be prohibited from imbibing intoxicating drinks during the period of the war. The Senate, as announced in The Times yesterday, voted to make it illegal to sell or give to any member of Congress liquor during the period of the war. Later in the session, however, the members relented, and this amendment to the war army bill was killed.


