PLACE DEEP TRUST IN AMERICAN ARMY

Italian War Envoy Sure It Will Prove Spirit.

SAYS ITALY SAVED ALLIES

Explains Why Japan's Armies Are Not Being Used.

Cluffell said that the present century must assure man that he will not have to fight any more war, spend all his money for fighting materials, and distrust his neighbor. The outcome of the war must be the ideal peace and justice with reciprocal respect assured by the vast majority, he declared.

"And," he said, "after President Wilson had proclaimed America's great stand, following the course of Lincoln and Washington, we all felt sure that this goal would be reached, even at great cost."

Says Purposes Are Identical. Most of Mr. Cluffell's statement was devoted to a declaration that America and Italy are in the war for identical purposes—to champion democracy against autocracy, to defend the weak from the strong.

He paid glowing tribute to President Wilson and the American people, and outlined the hearty sympathy existing in Italy for the United States.

Mr. Cluffell is one of the most important members of the Italian mission. His principal work is with Minister Enrico Ariotti, on transportation problems. He is one of the leading public men of Italy.

The rest of the mission spent the day visiting, after a series of lengthy conferences yesterday, which, Mr. Cluffell announced, had shown how well disposed the American authorities are toward the Italians.

Tomorrow the members will go before the House, where the head of the mission, the Prince of Udine, will speak.
