Can Beat One Club; Keep Jobs

Many Pitchers Stick in Big League Because They Have the Indian. Sign on Single Club.

Lew Richie was the original giant killer. His ability to wipe out all energy when he faced the New Yorkers for the Cubs kept him in the National League a long time after he had ceased to be useful against other clubs.

Other pitchers have flashed as phenoms against certain clubs, only to falter and do nothing against different ones. Always it's that way. A pitcher invariably is more successful against one club than another, and generally there are several hurlers in each of the majors who know of one club against whom they nearly always are winners.

Demaree Had it on 'Em. Last year and for two seasons back Al Demaree, of the Phillies, was the Giants' nemesis. He never started against the Giants that he didn't pitch a bang-up game, and he nearly always was returned winner. It wasn't until the fall end of the season that McGraw's stars were able to dispel the hypnotic influence his presence cast over their bats.

It was a sort of vengeance with him. He had been stamped on good by the Giants and was sent to the Phillies in a trade merely as "something thrown in." He pleaded for his chance against the Giants, got it, and has been keeping at it ever since. The Cubs have supplied most of this queer turn of hurlers. They nearly always carry one man who can turn back the Giants. This year Demaree is a Cub.

Rankin in Walter's Nemesis. Rankin Johnson, who was with the Red Sox for a while, and then jumped to the Federal League when he had a disagreement with the Boston club over salary, was a jinx to Walter Johnson. Whenever Boston was playing Washington, Walter Johnson carried Rankin Johnson against the Red Sox. It always was Rankin Johnson's turn to work. His first game of any importance in the American League was a 1 to 0 affair in which he downed the mighty Walter.

Exasperating as it must have been Rankin Johnson steadily defeated his famous gamesake. They had many famous battles before the Federal League and caused him to be sent back to the minors. Stanley Covaleskie, now with Cleveland, once beat the Giants out of a pennant single-handed, when he was "accredited" with the Phillies. The season was drawing near its close and the Giants were in a tight battle for the leadership.

It had been charged that Philadelphia really wanted to see the Giants win, and for that reason dished up a pitcher who had little chance of winning. To the amazement of the Phillies, the Giants, and everyone else concerned, he not only defeated the Giants in his first encounter with them, but did it twice during the series and jacked New York out of the running.

Bill Doak, considerable hurler at all times, nevertheless, never feels more at his ease than when he is occupying the pitcher's box at the Polo Grounds against the Giants.
