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BOY SCOUTS REPAIR CROP STORM LOSS

Fifteen Hundred Take Up Work of Garden Salvage.

DAMAGE LESS THAN FEARED

Only Tracts in Open Suburbs of City Suffered Much.

Fifteen hundred Washington Boy Scouts, armed with hoes and rakes, set out early this morning to render first aid to gardens injured by yesterday's storm.

More than 300 scouts were detailed for duty in backyard and vacant lot gardens. Twelve hundred of these gardens are being worked by scouts in various sections of the city.

Washouts in Open Places. H. M. Conolly, Department of Agriculture, demonstrator and chief inspector in the Times garden contest, said this morning that the damage to gardens caused by the storm, was not as great as was first thought.

Gardens in outlying sections suffered most from the storm. Garden lots in the city with but very few exceptions are protected from wind storms by fences or adjoining buildings.

Washouts occurred in a number of large gardens in the open. A. J. Driscoll, member of the Central Garden Committee, said that gardens in the territory covered by the Mid-City Citizens' Association did not suffer.

"I do not know of a garden that was destroyed by the storm," Mr. Driscoll said.

ASKS SPECIAL RIGHT TO WEAR ARMY "TOGS"

Mrs. Pirrone Presents Request to War Department.

Mrs. Harriette Pirrone, who was Washington's only fully uniformed woman recruiting officer, but who was ordered by police authorities to resume woman's clothes, is today seeking special permission from the War Department to continue wearing the regulation uniform.

On Wednesday Mrs. Pirrone, who for four days had been achieving success as a recruiting officer, was instructed by Captain Thayer, of the First precinct, to remove the soldier's uniform. The law prohibits anyone not in the service of the country from wearing the uniform.

During the four days in which Mrs. Pirrone appeared on the streets attired in the natty suit of men's clothing, she sent nearly a dozen men to

the army recruiting tent at Seventh street and Pennsylvania avenue, she would approach a youth on the street and interest him in the service. The "lounge lizard" and the "parlor athlete" were her special game.

Officials at the War Department are today taking the matter up, and are expected to soon decide whether Mrs. Pirrone will be permitted special privileges to aid in obtaining recruits.

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PARK VIEW PROCLAIMS SECRETARY ELECTION

Every Adult of Both Sexes Has Right of Suffrage.

Park View today issued an official announcement of the first election for a paid public officer in the District since 1874. The election is for community secretary, who will receive his salary from the District, as authorized by the last session of Congress.

The election is to be held next Tuesday evening, at 8 o'clock, in the auditorium of the Park View School, Newton and Warder streets. In the circular announcing the election, every adult citizen of the section is invited to take part. It will be a strictly equal suffrage affair, with both men and women voting.

Asks \$500 Out of \$5,000. Pupils of the school have made the ballot boxes to be used at the election. Five thousand dollars was appropriated for salaries for various community secretaries in the District, and Park View is asking \$500 of that sum. Miss Cecil B. Norton, at present community secretary, receives a privately donated salary. She has announced, however, that she will be unable to continue at her duties after

July 1, when the appropriation goes into effect.

Refusals Nomination. John G. McGrath, president of the Park City Citizens' Association, was nominated for the office by the community center committee of the association this week, but he refused to consider the matter on the ground that the committee did not actually represent the entire community.

Nominations, therefore, will not be made until the night of the election. The community secretary will be the responsible head of all community movements, except those of the citizens association.
