

WAR GARDENS SAFE FROM COLD SPELL

Low Temperature Will Not Affect Growing Plants.

CONOLLY GIVES ASSURANCE

Advises Against Picking Beans While Wet With Dew.

Washington gardeners need have no fear that the cold snap which settled upon Washington after Thursday's storm will injure "war gardens."

"Don't pick beans while the plant is wet with dew or rain," is Mr. Conolly's advice to gardeners.

Repair Storm Damage. After two days of hard work in their farm in Potomac Park, Washington Boy Scouts yesterday had repaired the damage done to the corn crop by Thursday's storm.

Pursuant to the suggestion of Assistant Secretary of Agricultural Vrooman that Boy Scouts of America organize a boy patrol to prevent petty garden thieving, Scouts of Washington will be prepared tomorrow to keep a close watch on every garden in the city.

"Boy patrols will be a great aid to the gardening campaign," declared Mr. Vrooman. "Few people realize that this evil is perhaps the greatest single factor tending to discourage home gardening in cities."

Boy Scouts have had a detail on duty daily guarding their own farm and individual gardens owned by scout members.

Ground pits, outdoor cellars, or cool rooms in the basement of homes are good places to store surplus vegetables, such as beets, turnips, saffirs, parsnips, winter radish, and cabbages.

"In a great many sections of the District," said Mr. Conolly, "there is plenty of garden space where pits or outdoor cellars may be constructed, but in thickly settled sections of the city this means of storage is impossible."

TWO-MINUTE BATTLE VICTORY FOR BRITISH

Tommies Surge Into Teuton Trench At Breakfast Time.

WITH THE BRITISH FORCES IN FRANCE, June 17.—In a two-minute "battle" the British captured three-quarters of a mile of trenches on Infantry Hill, east of Monchy le Preux.

The British stole out of their trenches in broad daylight without a single shot of artillery preparation having been fired, rushed across No Man's Land, surprised the German garrison at breakfast and took three officers and 175 other prisoners without the slightest effort.

It was only after they had accomplished all this that the British barrage was placed behind the German position, and cut off any possible relief or immediate counter attack from that direction.

There were only two British casualties. Two enemy machine guns captured had not fired a single round during the attack.

SON OF SINGLE TAXER IS HELD AS SLACKER

Delawarean Declares Intention of Fighting Registry Law.

WILMINGTON, Del., June 17.—Donald Stephens, twenty-seven year old, son of J. Frank Stephens, one of the founders of Arden, the single tax colony at Harvey station, is being kept Delawarean to be arrested by the Federal authorities as a slacker.

Stephens, who had failed to register, was arrested by United States Marshal Harry. Arraigned before United States Commissioner William G. Mahaffy, he was held under \$1,500 bail for the grand jury.
