COBB COMES HERE MONDAY TO POUND GRIFFS' HURLERS

By LOUIS A. DOUGHER. Ty Cobb will be here Monday, accompanied by a number of assistants from Detroit, all seeking to shove the Griffins down, down, down into the vasty deep. Four games are scheduled for the first four days of the week, the St. Louis Browns following the ferocious felines into the Georgia avenue confines.

Condie Mack and Hughie Jennings had expected to play at Detroit tomorrow, asking the consent of Manager Griffith and Lee Fohl to hold open dates on Monday, with double-headers on Tuesday. The Old Fox replied to Jennings, but has never heard of the matter since. Consequently he will line his young men up against the Tigers here Monday.

Had the Tigers gone home for a Sunday game, it would have been impossible for them to have arrived here in time to play Monday or for the Mackmen to get home in time to meet the Indians.

Play at Cleveland. The Griffins will play the Indians at Cleveland tomorrow. This game has been transferred from Washington to take advantage of an idle Sunday date where thousands of fans turn out to see ball games on their day of rest.

Joe Boehling can hang around Lee Fohl for another week or so now. He won a game from the Griffins, even though he didn't perform to the very end. He removed his smiling morning face from the battery, and on the sixth inning of the first game, he had disposed of the enemy, Otis Lambeth, a promising youngster, went through to the end in happy fashion. Boehling was on trial yesterday. He has done very little work for the Cleveland club this season, and Lee Fohl's patience was about exhausted. He commended with Boehling.
