Hohler, second counselor of the British embassy, will entertain at dinner this evening in compliment to the British ambassador, Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice, who is residing with Mr. Hohler at his residence, 2330 Massachusetts avenue, during the absence of Lady Spring-Rice.
