

### PERSIAN CHIEFTAIN TRANSPORTS COURT TO ARABIAN NIGHTS

ELIZABETH, N. J., Aug. 26.—A scene suggesting the "Arabian Nights" was enacted yesterday afternoon, in this city, in the office of Alfred A. Stein, county prosecutor.

John De Pasha, who says he is a son of a Persian chieftain, had just been released from the county jail, where he languished for two weeks.

The prosecutor, who had discovered De Pasha's innocence and also the romantic circumstances under which he had come to this country to round up 800 of his father's subjects, tendered him the regrets of the county authorities.

De Pasha, a young man of noble bearing and gentle demeanor, assumed a rich Persian costume, topped with a turban of silk. With a princely gesture he produced a jeweled gold vessel containing salt. This he extended to Mr. Stein and his detectives, insisting each should solemnly take a pinch with him as a symbol of life-long amity.

The ceremony over, De Pasha went to New York with agents of the department of justice, who try to lead him in completing his mission.

Already, according to Chief County Detective Galatian, the Federal men have arrested three Persian priests of a fanatic order who are said to have lured the missing 800 tribesmen of De Pasha's father to this country. These men are now at Ellis Island, Galatian says, under proceedings taken with a view to their deportation as undesirable aliens. They are said to be exponents of a religion which embraces some of the rites of the ancient sun worshippers and certain other practices known among American Indians, particularly the Apaches.

De Pasha's father is All Ben Hassan Muzaka, ruler of a mountainous region of Persia, seldom penetrated by white travelers. The little dominion was practically crippled by the fanatic uprising which culminated in the exodus to this country.

The chief's son is an accomplished young man who has studied English. His presence in this country became known to the leaders of his father's people, who had scattered among the Syrian colonies of New Jersey manufacturing towns. They are blamed for his arrest.

In the course of his search for them he had collected funds for Syrian war relief, and his enemies told the authorities he was an impostor. When arraigned he was so anxious not to reveal his mission that he made no defense. Mr. Stein's investigation resulted in his vindication.

### American Troops' Letters From Home Will Travel 'Rush'

LONDON, Aug. 26.—American soldiers' precious letters from "back home" have the right of way over everything. They travel "rush."

To pick up new wrinkles in swift handling of mail, the American postoffice today has William A. Kenyon inspecting the allies' methods. Anything to gain a few hours or minutes in expediting the soldiers' letters will be utilized.

More than fifty experts in mail handling are now at the American sea base in France arranging a mail system. More mail clerks will accompany every American contingent.

### 200 SUFFRAGISTS PROTEST AGAINST PICKETING POLICY

Mrs. S. F. Martin, a local business woman and prominent member of the National Woman's Party, who made a public protest a week ago against the picketing tactics of the leaders of the suffragettes, today announced that she has received letters from more than 200 women eager to stop the militants' White House picketing. The 200 women include many members of the National Woman's Party, Mrs. Martin said.

"Our leaders are in danger and our cause is being dishonored. Do your part, publicly protest, and demand a sane policy."

This was the substance of a message sent to members of the party today by Mrs. Martin. She declares that a large majority of the women in the party are willing to go to the extreme of removing the present leaders in order to put a ban on picketing.

She has asked that all protests be sent to her at 7301 Georgia avenue northwest. Among those who have sent letters of protest are Miss Catherine Drayton, secretary of the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Suffrage Club; from Miss Pinley, and Mrs. Rebecca R. Paxton, of Woodstock, Va., who characterized the work of the suffragette pickets as a "disgrace, not voicing the will of the bulk of the party."

### OREGON TROOPS SEARCH FORESTS FOR 'FIREBUGS'

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 26.—With orders to kill any persons found starting forest fires, detachments of armed Oregon troops are scouring the Oregon forests today.
