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We were fortunate in having a large stock of lenses on hand before the war, hence were not affected by the advance in price or by the shortage.

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20 MILLION DOOR BELLS TO BE RUNG IN FOOD CAMPAIGN

Herbert C. Hoover and his helpers are going to ring every doorbell in the country between October 21 and 28, and ask the folks who answer if they're really saving food.

Only about 2,000,000 of America's 22,000,000 households have actually signed Hoover's food pledge and hung it in their kitchens. And while Hoover thinks the other 20,000,000 really are conserving food "because already the home savings are visibly increasing the available supplies," he wants to know for sure.

"Food Will Win the War," is the slogan adopted by the Food Administration for that week. The foods which must be saved are: Wheat, beef, pork, lard products, and sugar.

In appealing for conservation of supplies, Food Administrator Hoover says: "The allies are our first line of defense. They must be fed, and the food will win the war. All Europe is on rations or restricted supplies. Only in our own countries is each one permitted to judge for himself the duty he owes his country in food consumption, although the world depends upon us to guard and provide its food supply.

"This is a duty of necessity, humanity, and honor. As a free people we have elected to discharge this duty, not under the autocratic decree but without other restraint than the guidance of individual conscience.

"On the success of this unprecedented adventure in democracy will largely stake the issue of the war."

The Food Administrator's appeal is directed to the churches, the schools, all organizations, civic and social, and to the individuals in every community.
