

'BOARDING HOUSES' MAY BE TRAPS FOR GIRLS, SAYS LASKEY

Declaring that young girls may easily be led to their ruin in disorderly resorts which operate under the guise of boarding houses, District Attorney Laskey today served warning that Washington will be purged of such places as fast as the police can get at them.

It was indicated today that information is now in the hands of the District Attorney which indicates the existence of other disorderly houses operating as boarding and rooming houses, and that the conviction of Franklin C. Jackson and his wife, Trina, for maintaining a disorderly house at 1918 Fourteenth street northwest, may shortly be followed by other prosecutions.

Of wide interest is the announcement from New York of the engagement of Miss Marguerite Shonts, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore P. Shonts, and Rutherford Bingham, son of Brig. Gen. Theodore A. Bingham, U. S. A., retired, and Mrs. Bingham. Miss Shonts lives with her parents at the Plaza in New York.

The bride-to-be is well known in society in this city, New York, Chicago, Newport, and abroad, where she spent some time in Paris with her sister, the Duchess de Chaulnes, before the latter returned to this country to reside. Miss Shonts was born in Washington and lived here for a number of years. She was very popular in Washington society, where she made her debut.

Her mother is a daughter of the late Gov. Francis M. Drake of Iowa. Last summer Miss Shonts purchased a villa in Newport. She spends part of the winter season each year in the South, and usually accompanies her sister and her nephew, the young Duke de Chaulnes. His mother was Miss Theodora M. Shonts.

Mr. Shonts' father is president of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company of New York, and of the New York Railways Company. He was chairman of the Isthmian Canal Commission during the Roosevelt Administration, resigning from that position in 1907 to accept the presidency of the Interborough.

Mr. Bingham's father was for some time Police Commissioner of New York. The son was graduated from the Boston Institute of Technology and later went to Pittsburgh, where he held a position with the Crucible Steel Company of America. Soon afterwards he joined the Twelfth regiment N. G. N. Y. and attained the rank of lieutenant. Later he joined the Eighteenth infantry of Pennsylvania with the rank of captain.

He entered the diplomatic service in 1911 and was appointed as secretary of the American legation at Quito, Chili. In 1915 he was assigned to the Latin-American division of the State Department in this city. He was in Washington for several years and was one of the most popular young bachelors in society. From here he was sent to Vienna and was one of the secretaries of the American embassy in that city when Frederick C. Penfield was ambassador. He returned to this country with Mr. Penfield some months ago. Mr. Bingham is now in this city awaiting orders. He belongs to the Metropolitan Club in this city and to the St. Nicholas Society of New York. No date has been set for the wedding.
