

**GEORGETOWN LAWS ELECTS.**

William J. Cullins is today receiving the congratulations of his classmates on his election to the presidency of the 1918 class of the Georgetown Law School. Other officers chosen were: P. Jerome Pasch, secretary; Charles E. Spitzer, treasurer; Joseph F. Drury, historian; Fred J. Neuland, sergeant-at-arms; and George H. McGrath, editor of Doomsday Book. The election took place last night, at which time the class also voted to buy a Liberty bond.

**CITY'S QUOTA OF COLORED TROOPS STARTS FOR MEADE**

Washington's quota of 410 colored men selected for the national army completed its first lap in the journey to the French trenches when it embarked at the Union Station today for Camp Meade, Md.

A throng of more than 5,000 persons was present to bid the men farewell. The 410 men assembled at the Franklin School and the old Central High School building. A line was formed, headed by Lieut. Col. Arthur Brooks, District national guard, retired, who acted as marshal, and Frank Wells, chairman of the committee in charge.

Every man carried an American flag. The parade moved around the Columbus statue and entered the station by the east entrance just after 8 o'clock, as the colored Elks' Band played "Onward, Christian Soldiers." At the station they were met by Willis' Female Band, which played as the men marched into the concourse.

**HOROWITZ AIDS RED CROSS.**

Louis J. Horowitz, of New York, is today director of foreign relief of the American Red Cross, and will act as a connecting link between the Red Cross commissions abroad and the organization in the United States. It is understood that Mr. Horowitz has offered his services without pay for the period of the war.

**Privates in Marines Get Higher Pay Than Do Foreign Officers**

According to statistics in a war bulletin issued by the National Geographic Society from its headquarters here, a first-class private in the United States Marine Corps, serving abroad, draws \$41 a year more than a Russian colonel, \$64 a year more than a German lieutenant for the first three years, \$81 a year more than a first lieutenant of the Austrian army, and \$10 a year more than a junior lieutenant in the service of Italy.

**WRECK SURVIVORS LANDED BY FISHING BOAT AT VERY CRUZ**

VERA CRUZ, Mexico, Oct. 28.—The fishing vessel Dolores Larrea has arrived here with seven survivors of the American fruit vessel Olympia. The Olympia was wrecked near Fronteras, and the survivors were in two small boats when rescued. Fourteen other members of the lost vessel's crew are missing.

**NAVY YARD HERE TO BE DOUBLED; COST \$7,500,000**

The Washington Navy Yard is to be doubled in size, \$7,500,000 is to be spent in improvements, and 4,000 machinists will be added to the working force.

Such is the announcement of Secretary of the Navy Daniels. Contractors are already busy on their estimates, for bids are to be submitted by Thursday, and the plan call for the completion of all new construction within six months and some of it within ninety days.

The improvements, as announced last night by Secretary of the Navy Daniels, are to cost approximately \$7,500,000, and although contractors have grown used to war-time speeding up the size of the job and the time allotted has them staggered for the moment.

**Largest Gun Factory.** When the proposed extension of the plant is completed, Washington will have the largest gun factory in the world.

The present force of men at the yard, numbering about 8,000 employees, will be increased to 12,000.

The largest of the new structures is to be the new miscellaneous machine shop, which is to cost approximately \$7,000,000.

A brass foundry designed to double the output of castings will be built at an estimated cost of \$225,000.

**More Land Needed.** A third new building, a pattern shop, is planned. Additions to the steel foundry and the forge shop will also be made.

The contemplated improvements will necessitate the adding of new territory, which will take in the ground from Ninth street southeast, the present eastern boundary of the yard, to Eleventh street southeast, and from K street southeast to the river.

**THIEF LOOTS SHOE STORE OF 100 GUM HEELS**

The thief who early this morning broke into the store of Sam Wertler, 1407 Q street northwest, is provided with enough rubber heels to gum-shoe the rest of his life. He got away with fifty pairs. His other loot was twenty pairs of shoes, the whole valued at about \$90.

**CARDINAL HOLDS SERVICE FOR MEN AT CAMP MEADE**

CAMP MEADE, Md., Oct. 28.—Religious life at Camp Meade is at its highest pitch today. The big Young Men's Christian Association auditorium and the Knights of Columbus recreation center were formally opened today.

Cardinal Gibbons and J. Wilbur Chapman, the noted evangelist, will conduct services at each dedication. General Kuhn will speak at the Y. M. C. A. at 2 o'clock, and at the Knights of Columbus ceremonies at 4 o'clock.

Services, masses, and song concerts attracted throngs of soldiers and visitors.

**Tribute by the Chaplain.** In speaking of the spiritual welfare of the boys, Father, Wilmoth, chaplain attached to the camp, said:

"I would like to have the fathers, mothers, sisters, and sweethearts see what clean, pure-minded men we have down here."

In compliment to the Washington men, Father Wilmoth said:

"I have never been privileged to meet a finer group of men than those that comprise the Seventy-ninth division. They are a credit to God and to their country, and there need not be any fear about what they will do when the supreme moment comes."

On the same subject the Rev. G. L. Goodell, who is camp director of the Y. M. C. A. on religious activities, said:

"I have never seen a single soldier who was drunk while I have been at Camp Meade. The moral tone of this camp is magnificent. I have never seen a woman in this camp who looked as though she was objectionable."

**Gale Hits the Camp.**

A terrific gale, followed by a heavy rain, somewhat marred the Liberty loan celebration last night. General Kuhn decided not to start the bonfire, as had been planned, for fear that the wind would spread the sparks to the buildings.

Camp Meade believes today, however, that it holds the cantonment record for the largest second Liberty loan subscription. The total has not been tabulated, but it is expected to run close to the \$2,000,000 mark, and may exceed it.

**U. S. ARMY OFFICER FOUND NOT GUILTY OF KILLING YOUTH**

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Oct. 28.—Dr. William J. Condon, captain in the medical corps, U. S. A., was acquitted yesterday afternoon of the murder of John V. Piper, a Rutgers College student. The jury was out about two hours. The verdict was greeted with applause by the spectators in the courtroom.
