PETROGRAD, Feb. 9.—(Delayed)—Kieff has been recaptured by Bolsheviki troops. The Radas (Ukrainian) forces were routed and are in flight. The Red Guards routed General Alekseev's forces at Makeyevka, Lomsk and Zivovsk.

EXPECT VON HERTLING TO ADDRESS REICHSTAG ON RUSSIAN PROBLEM

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 18.—The German Reichstag is scheduled to reconvene in Berlin tomorrow, and before the end of the week the chancellor will make an important speech, discussing not only peace, but the situation involving a renewal of hostilities against Russia in the east, said a telegram from the frontier today.

ITALIANS TAUNT AUSTRIAN NAVY

HEAVY DEATH TOLL ON JACOB JONES DUE TO OWN BOMBS

Explosion of her own depth bombs was responsible in a great measure for the heavy loss of life on the destroyer Jacob Jones, which was torpedoed by a German submarine on December 31. This was disclosed today when the Navy Department received the report of the board of inquiry appointed by Admiral Sims to investigate the circumstances surrounding the sinking.

The explosion of one of the depth bombs, which apparently fell into the water when the destroyer listed badly, might have resulted in the death of Commander David Worth Bagley, of the Jones, Bagley had fallen into the water, the report says, and was being dragged aboard a raft when an explosion beneath him hurled him high into the air. It was with considerable difficulty that he was rescued, and he was unconscious when finally hauled aboard the life raft.

When the vessel went down, a series of explosions followed. Those men directly over the exploding bombs were killed. The death toll was sixty-two enlisted men and two officers, but the number who were killed by the bombs never will be known. It is the opinion of the board of inquiry, however, that the percentage was large.

And to further discredit the Bolsheviki, officials of the Kerensky regime in Washington have issued a pamphlet for circulation among the Russian consular agents here and for the guidance of this and other government officials.

In speaking of the Bolsheviki these embassy officials say: "Their 'internationalism' is not based on the ideal of unity and cooperation of nations entitled to develop themselves along their own specific lines, but is a striving for universal revolution of the world's proletariat and the raising of a merciless class struggle."

The fancy of the Bolsheviki draws, beyond the conclusion of the present war, a sinister picture that shows, instead of peaceful development of nations applying their energies to creative activities, destroying flames of social revolution throughout the world.

Sailors of the Russian Baltic fleet, first to embrace the original Petrograd revolution and then to jump to the Bolsheviki, have broken away to complete anarchy and are carrying fire and blood through Finland.

These roving, disorganized bands of marauders have killed their officers and refused to obey the orders of the Petrograd Bolsheviki. They have stripped the country bare of provisions and plundered ruthlessly.

Delay in passing the Administration railway bill is jeopardizing the prosperity of the country and imperiling its success in the war, Railways Director McAdoo warned the House this afternoon.

In a letter to Chairman Simons of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, which was read to the House, Director McAdoo urged immediate action on the bill. The necessity was so great, he said, that he could not overemphasize it.


It was announced at the dinner that Congress would be petitioned to reimburse Hennig for the money he spent in fighting the charge.

24 GERMAN AEROPLANES BRITISH 24-HOUR RECORD

Cattle Will Fatter If Fed Feterita; Why Not People?

Feterita is not a cigarette or a musical comedy. It's strictly patriotic—the latest substitute for wheat urged by Herbert Hoover as an ingredient for Victory bread.

Growing heat on arid plains, this new grain with its small round berry, similar to that of kaffir corn, is nearly as high in nutritive value as wheat. It is not widely grown as yet, but farmers are rapidly introducing feterita, and it will be sold in leading markets next year.

Feterita flour is palatable and dark like graham flour. It has been used almost exclusively for feeding livestock.

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PORTUGUESE TAKE GERMAN PRISONERS IN SHARP FIGHT

LONDON, Feb. 18.—Portuguese troops have been active on the west front again, Field Marshal Haig reported today. They took a few German prisoners in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapelle.

"One of our posts drove off hostile raiders near Havrille," he said. "Several casualties were inflicted on the enemy in a patrol encounter in the Mestree sector. Near the south of Arras and Cambrai on the north bank of the Scheldt, in the neighborhood of Zonnebeker."

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FRANCES STARR TO GIVE BELGIAN POEM AT CONCERT

Sing, Belgians, sing, although our wounds may bleed, louder than the storm, louder than the guns.

The words of this heroic Belgian carol—from "Carillon," the great poem by the poet of the Belgians, Emile Cammaerts—ring out with a manifold meaning to Americans as the eyes of the American National Week of Song that again is to be celebrated throughout the land this week.

The indomitable spirit of this little land is spoken in these words. It is this poem that inspired the English composer, Sir Edward Elgar, to put a musical setting for it in the form of a "Melodrama," where the words are spoken, either to the music, or at times between parts of the musical story, as in the case of the heroism and the sadness of this land.

A "requiem" for the strange and appalling martyrdom of Belgium is sung in the lyrics: Will branches of beech, of flaming beech, To the sound of the drum, We'll cover the graves of our children.

Miss Frances Starr, through the courtesy of David Belasco, will recite this Belgian patriotic poem at the next concert of the Symphony Society of New York, under Walter Damrosch, to the music of Elgar, played by full orchestra.

"Carillon" was first produced in this country more than a year ago, at the Worcester festival, at which time it was read in the original French. This translation has been made by Tita Brand-Cammaerts. The work was written by poet and composer for the famous King Albert book.

Clad in robes of gray, Miss Starr is made to express the full vigor of patriotism and the martyred spirit of noble Belgium.

Emile Cammaerts has voiced in forceful words the appeal of his country to all the civilized world. He came to this country and made a stirring address last year in Aeolian Hall, New York, in the "Fight for Right" movement. Another work of his, "Through Iron Bars," is published in a little book with some of the most gripping drawings of Raemaekers as illustrations. The frontispiece is of Belgium—a figure of crushed womanhood, imprisoned behind iron bars. Another woman, in armor, heroic, yet lovingly, is leading through the bars and is kissing the wounded Belgian on her bowed head.

In a poem "To My Country in Bondage," the Belgian poet cries: Comblen de temps, comblen de temps, O mon amie, Tendras-tu patiemment, Evras-tu maux, Teu mains meurtries?

How long, oh, how long, Beloved land, Will thou stretch out toward me Patiently in the night? Thy bruised hands?

And the answer is still an unresolvable cadence has been made by King Arthur's knights of the Holy Grail, whose joy it was to "go about redressing human wrong," the chivalrous lads of the United States say solemnly, but firmly, in their stalwart soldier talk, "This is my job." It all amounts to the same thing, even though it is not poetically put.

Because this week of February 17-23 is the National Week of Song, and because February 22 is the birthday of "the Father of our Country," it is proposed that on the evening of the 22d, at 8 o'clock, all citizens of our country, wherever assembled, shall rise and sing all four verses of "My Country 'Tis of Thee."

Let the whole nation sing.

MILLMEN FEAR RIOTING; ASK DANIELS FOR COAL

The suggestion of L. W. W. riots in the New England industrial cities, unless coal is furnished at once to New England, was presented to Secretary of the Navy Daniels by a group of textile and other mill men from Boston and vicinity.

Asking that naval colliers or other vessels be placed at the disposal of the section of the country, the delegation declared that at the end of two weeks at least 300,000 foreigners would be out of work in the big centers, if the coal was not forthcoming.

"We want to do what we can," the delegation told Daniels, "but we do not dare face the consequences of our strike and other disturbances in the foreign centers if the coal is not sent us."
