

**MEADE SOLDIERS
TAKE LESSONS IN
RUNNING MOVIES**

CAMP MEADE, Md., Feb. 25.—An important step in a new direction has been taken by H. P. Morehead, of Baltimore, N. Y. M. C. A. secretary, who is a former owner of movie houses in Baltimore and Washington. He is giving instruction in the operation of moving picture machines to a class of ten soldiers who think they would like to follow that line of work when they finish up the big job "over there."

The suggestion has been made by The Washington Times that soldiers while in camp be taught something that will be useful to them in later years. In line with this, there visited the camp, at the request of William F. Cochran, the Y. M. C. A. educational secretary, Dr. A. P. Herring, who is working with national agencies to have ready work that a wounded soldier could do in cases where he could not return to his former line of employment.

This school for moving picture operators is for men who fear that injuries may make it impossible for them to go back to the old jobs. All a man needs is a good arm to turn the crank, good eyes to observe the picture, and judgment as to how fast to operate.

It is easy to imagine the popularity of a theater that could announce on a card "The man operating this machine has been through the battles he is now throwing on the screen."

The first of the chaplains to leave for the special school for instruction in their line of military duties is Lieut. P. M. Holderman, of the 210th regiment. The school is at Fort Monroe, Va. Other chaplains may visit there to get a line on the system of work.

**BALTIMORE COMPANY
IN MILITARY POLICE**

CAMP MEADE, Md., Feb. 25.—The military police force has been increased by the addition of a large part of Company I, 210th Regiment, men who came from Baltimore. This detachment served with the police for awhile when the force was getting out of quarters and men were receiving furloughs to visit their homes.

The Company I men have now moved out of barracks and turned over a building on the main road in front of 210th headquarters to new-arrived rookies. These new men are part of the depot brigade, but some of them may be taken into the Baltimore regiment to fill the quota for overseas service. They will not, however, join in the 210th program of training until they have had the elementary training and the system given at the depot brigade to all new men.

The 210th will get target practice this week on the big range, after having made a fine showing on the obstacle course. The distance range is near Francis, on the W. B. and A. railway line, several miles south of Naval Academy Junction in open flat country, distinct in every way from the hilly section at the north end of the camp.

**COLONIAL DAMES WILL
EQUIP HOSPITAL SHIPS**

The boys in our navy who suffer from wounds or sickness will find that time will not be heavily on their hands if they are quartered on the hospital ships equipped by the Society of Colonial Dames has announced that it is going to provide a complete equipment of motion picture films and projectors and photographs and records without number to while away the dreary hours of convalescence.

The entertainment of the patients, however, forms the smallest part of the work that the society has planned. It is to outfit both ships with operating rooms, complete with all apparatus, including X-rays and a supply of rare drugs.

The cost of the equipment is estimated at \$50,000.

**WOMAN IS NAMED
AS I. W. W. FIREBUG**

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 25.—A woman was named as the leader in alleged destructive acts of the I. W. W. along the Pacific Coast in a confession of Fritz Hagerman, who is in the custody of Federal authorities. The confession, they said, detailed plots to burn grain and buildings and poison cattle in four States.

The woman was named as one of six persons who went to Lassen county last September to ignite the \$1,000,000 plant of the Red River Lumber Company. Hagerman confessed, the officials said, that he had poisoned cattle in California, Oregon, Idaho, and Washington.

**63 SURVIVORS OF
TUSCANIA IN HOSPITALS**

Sixty-three survivors of the Tuscania, torpedoed by a German submarine off the Irish coast on February 5, are today being cared for in hospitals at Londonderry, Lough Beg, and Dublin, announced the War Department.

None of the men are said to be in serious condition and it is believed that they will be discharged from hospitals within a short time.




