

the District a sanitary corps to act as an auxiliary to the Red Cross. Boys in the schools who are over the age of sixteen and who meet the physical requirements are eligible for enlistment. The boys will be trained in first aid and other branches of Red Cross work under the leadership of company officers to be chosen by themselves, and will be instructed by medical officers appointed by the Potomac division of the national organization.

The plans now call for a company of twenty-five in each of the high schools. A uniform will be provided for those qualifying. A competitive meet for all companies will be held in the summer. The Red Cross, in announcing the new move, stated that such companies have been doing valuable work in France almost since the beginning of the war.
