What It Congress Did Yesterday... Public Ownership as a Subject for Popular Discussion in November—Hearings Begun by the House Committee on Interstate Commerce—Price-Fixing Pronounced a Failure—The Final Fight on Railroad Control in the Senate—Eight Obstinate Men Go on Record—District of Columbia Salaries—Points on Profiteering—Deadlock on the Overman "More Power" Bill.

Thetus Sims, Tennessee, chairman of the House Committee on Interstate Commerce, opened the doors of his committee room and offered the hospitality of a public hearing to a campaign issue on which quite a few Democrats may think they will have a fighting chance to hold Congress in November...

Mr. Kelley and Mr. Benjamin T. Marsh, secretary of the National High Cost of Living Association, spoke in favor of the bill and against the high cost of living to which both are much opposed. They explained that it will disappear only when unearned profits are cut out...

The Senate closed its day's labors by submitting to a record vote on the railroad bill. It was adopted as it came finally from conference by 47 to 8—the eight who would rather be right (and perhaps President) being Messrs. Borah, Cummins, Gore, Gronna, Johnson of California, Kenyon, Norris, and Townsend.

On the point of order sustained against the clause in the bill as it came from conference, limiting the taxing power of the States, the appeal from the ruling of the Chair, sustained the Chair, and sent the bill back to conference. As it was again reported, the principal speeches against it were made by Senators Townsend and Cummins, with support given them by other Senators and responses in favor of the Administration.

M'ADOO WILL ASK CONGRESS RECESS TO PUSH NEW LOAN

A ten-day recess of Congress to allow Senators and Congressmen to return to their home districts and boom the Liberty loan campaign will be proposed by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo to Speaker Clark of the House and the Vice President within the next few days.

The House continued to debate and amend the legislative, executive, and judicial appropriation bill without reaching a vote on it. The delay was due chiefly to the amendment increasing the salaries of Government employes in the District of Columbia. It provided a "flat increase" of \$120 a year for all draw-ins up to and including \$2,000 a year.

A delegation of lumber men, with Congressman Fordney introducing them, appeared before the Senate Committee on Military Affairs to protest against further "commahandering" or "stalking over" the committee then heard officials of the War Department in explanation of the series of authorized measures, now before Congress.

The Senate is now proceeding to consider the agricultural appropriation bill. Senator Calder introduced it by an able speech on the advantages of woman suffrage, as demonstrated in New York.

Mr. Johnson of Kentucky is not likely to miss any increase of from 50 to 250 per cent in District of Columbia rents, while his "anti-profiteering" bill is in the Senate. He reported several cases of that kind to the open session of the House yesterday. The Senate is certainly tired of using its "war powers," but profiteers cannot safely insult its dignity by increases of over a hundred per cent while it is trying to think of something more important.

SUFFRAGE LACKS ONLY TWO VOTES FOR AMENDMENT

Nation-wide women's suffrage was close to victory in the Senate yesterday. Indications, based upon statements of leaders on both sides, were that the resolution to submit the question to the States would be forced to a vote within the next few weeks.

Republicans Favor Vote. Senator Smoot of Utah declared that fully three-fourths of the Republican Senators were ready to adopt the resolution and that if the suffragists could win slightly over half the Democrats, the measure would be passed.
