**WASHINGTON JEWS TO HOLD BIG RALLY FOR LIBERTY LOAN**

"You know that we Jews are second to none in whole-souled loyalty. Now is the chance of a life-time to prove it."

This is the wording of the peremptory call that has gone out to all Jewish citizens of Washington from the committee in charge of the mass meeting and patriotic rally of Jews in the interest of the third Liberty loan. The meeting is to be held at the Eighth Street Temple next Wednesday night, and an attractive program has been arranged, including speeches by men of national prominence.

The circular in which the call for the meeting is issued says:

"Your country asks your help, so that its sons may successfully defend your liberties.

"While our boys are freely giving their lives, will you be laggard in lending your money?"

"You must come to this meeting—because you owe everything you are to your country; now give your country a chance to owe something to you."

"Because you know that we Jews are second to none in whole-souled loyalty; now is the chance of a life-time to prove it."

"Because our Jewish women have pledged our resources to our country's aid. We must back them up; will you help or hinder?"

"Because you have Liberty bonds; everyone has; but so long as your country calls for help you have not enough. So long as America needs more money you need more Liberty bonds."

"You need bring no money. Your pledges can be handed through your own bank. And if you have subscribed to the limit come to this meeting anyway; your example will be an inspiration to others."

"Come! Bring wife, sweetheart, children, friends. Make this meeting the most enthusiastic patriotic rally Washington has ever seen; show to the world how the Jew responds to the call of duty and the privileges of his American citizenship."

BOSTON, April 12.—"Zip" or "the missing link," the original "what is it," who, if we were to believe the side show banners and their silvery-tongued barkers, "caused scientists to put new creases in their brains and puzzled one and all in the civilized world," is now appearing and has been appearing for the last seventeen years, not before crowned heads, but poor topey-tary heads, the inmates of the insane department of the Tewksbury almshouse.

The "missing link" of the good old circus days is John Glida, born in England and brought to America for exhibition purposes.

Dr. John H. Nichols, superintendent of the almshouse, outlines the case. He says: "He has a small amount of brain, but, of course, he has no memory. His is a case of arrested development. When he was committed he was twenty-seven years of age, and that was in 1901, so you see he is forty-four years of age." For the short time that Johnny was exhibited at the museums and circuses he made tons of money for his managers. But not one cent did Johnny get. However, he now has a comfortable home and is well cared for.

**TAR AND FEATHERS, JAIL, BEATINGS, ETC.,—WOE TO DISLOYAL**

PENSACOLA, Fla., April 12.—Adam Struck failed to strike a responsive chord here when he berated President Wilson and the American Government. It struck the loyal citizens here as an example of disloyalty that should be used as an object lesson.

JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., April 12.—Joseph Goepfrich, a farmer, is in jail here today at his own request. He was about the safest of men, but he could find it difficult to escape the wrath of a mob which heard that he had threatened violence to a Liberty loan bond selling committee at his home near Dale.

ASHLAND, Wis., April 12.—This little city was today recovering from the excitement of a second tar and feather party in the past week. Adolph Anton, a bartender, was taken from his home last night by masked men and tarred and feathered because of his alleged pro-German utterances. Anton did not show up for work this morning.

**MARSHALL REPORT WILL RECOMMEND AERO DEPARTMENT**

Reported to carry a minimum of destructive criticism and a maximum of remedy, a second report on America's aircraft program will be filed shortly by the Marshall investigating committee named by President Wilson. The report, it is said, will recommend the creation of a department of aeronautics, with W. C. Potter, of New York, as its head. Mr. Potter is now civilian director of the air division of the signal corps.

The report will carry two main features, one being that contracts were awarded indiscriminately to persons knowing nothing of aircraft work and who were totally unprepared to fill them, and that the greatest error was that long time required in which to carry out the air program was underestimated.

**ARKANSAS TO SAVE 500,000 LBS. OF FLOUR**

A half million pounds of wheat flour will be saved in Arkansas, it was estimated today, each month by the hotels and restaurants who next Sunday eliminate wheat entirely from their menus until the next wheat crop arrives. Throughout the country large groups of people are pledging themselves to reduce their wheat consumption to 1 1/2 pounds per person a week.

Churches are taking a leading part in the conservation movement, the Christian Church of Dyersburg, Tenn., telegraphing today that its entire congregation is pledged not to consume more than three pounds for each member a month.
