Newly Born Babe and Resting Mothers Latest Victims of Foe's Kultur

PARIS, April 12.—"It is now the glory of Kultur to kill women in a maternity hospital, as well as little babies whose eyes are scarcely opened to the light," said Le Matin, editorially today. "The hospital was filled with women taking a rest, with their babies in the cradles. The afternoon was ideal, the sky was blue and the windows were open to let in the sunlight and fresh air. The cries of new born babes mingled with the crooning of lullabies. The daily visit of relatives and friends had just ended, and the nurses were tidying the wards when a shell fell, plowing up a great hole in the floor. A baby and two women were killed and eleven injured."

SEN. BROUSSARD DIES AT HOME IN LOUISIANA

Senators and House members today heard with profound regret and sorrow news from Louisiana of the death at his home in New Iberia of Senator Robert P. Broussard, from a complication of diseases. Senator Broussard had been in poor health for years, but some reports from his bedside recently had indicated he was improving.

Chicago Waiters Want Respectful Treatment When Guests Are Near

CHICAGO, April 12.—A new wage scale for 2,400 waiters, waitresses, cooks, and other employees was presented today to more than 200 restaurant owners by the Hotel and Restaurant Employees' Union. Strict rules are provided for waitresses. They must not do porter work or be reprimanded before guests. Incidentally, if they are working in places of open house in war, they must receive the same wages.

WAR DECLARATION BY URUGUAY WAITS ON GERMANS' REPLY

MONTEVIDEO, April 12.—An explanation is awaited today from Germany of the recent capture of a special Uruguayan military commission bound for France. In official circles, it is declared that the act means that Uruguay can no longer delay declaring a state of war against Germany, if confirmed. If Germany admits the capture, a declaration of war will immediately follow. If Germany claims a mistake has been made, Uruguay will demand that the commission be liberated on parole.

SUPER-CANNON FOR BRITISH

LONDON, April 12.—The British are building guns that will throw shells a distance of more than eighty miles, according to a statement in the House of Commons by J. I. Macpherson, parliamentary undersecretary.
