WRITING HISTORY OF THE STAGE IN NATION'S CAPITAL

Ten thousand photographs and half-tones, thousands of theater programs, and many hundred columns of newspaper clippings, great piles of typewritten manuscripts, an enormous collection of Washington theatrical records owned by Aloysius I. Mudd, who is engaged in writing the history of the stage in the National Capital.

Mr. Mudd has a record of every theatrical performance which has taken place in Washington since the first entertainment given in June, 1800, at Blodgett's Hotel. He owns original photographs of all the famous players of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries who have appeared here, and he has every newspaper account of every episode connected with the theater in Washington, such as the burning of old Ford's Theater, once a Baptist church.

Mr. Mudd is sixty-eight years of age, though he does not look it, and he has been theatergoing here since he was seven years of age. In those sixty-one years all the great figures of the American stage have swept before his eyes.

Mr. Mudd still goes to the theater when anything that is, in his opinion, worth watching comes along, and this is fairly often, for his taste is catholic. Nor does he think that all the great actors lived in the past. The stage today is in a healthy state, he believes.

BOARD OF TRADE PROTESTS REPEAL OF 50-50 CLAUSE

A unanimous protest by the board of directors of the Washington Board of Trade against repeal of the half-and-half system of taxation in the District, embodied in a resolution, is being sent today to each member of Congress.

Especially is the protest directed against repeal of the system "by rider on an appropriation bill; or in such form as to be retroactive; or by any method which does not secure for the proposed legislation through preliminary consideration by the District Committee and by Congress."

The members of the Board assert that Washington is in a position distinct from that of any other city in the country; that while other cities have manufacturing plants paying large sums in taxes the District's large buildings are owned by the government and it derives no revenue from them.

The number of tickets to the annual shad-bake on May 18 at Chesapeake Beach will be limited to 600, according to William Claiborn, chairman of the committee in charge. Sales of tickets will close May 13. A number of novel features for this year's shad-bake are being planned.

Barber Inaugurates Shaveless Day Plan To Help Win the War

PHILADELPHIA, May 7.—To help the Government, Philip de Marse, a Wayne barber, has instituted a "Shaveless Monday" and a "Barberless Thursday Night" by the following advertisement:

"Notice to the Public: Owing to present conditions, it is impossible for me to secure an assistant. I am willing to accommodate my patrons at all hours, with the following exceptions: "Closed all day Monday for gardening.

"Closed Thursday, 6 p. m. for Company B. "Otherwise, I will be here to suit your convenience. Will you co-operate with me in this patriotic service? "Yours for success, "P. DE MARSE"

The old-fashioned cabaret with its wine, women and song expired when the clock struck twelve. It was killed by city ordinance, and from now on the only amusement cafes will furnish with drinks will be provided by an orchestra soberly mounted on a platform.
