

FORTY AMERICANS MADE PRISONERS BY THE GERMANS

The War Department has made public the names of forty Americans held prisoners of war in Germany, with the dates of their capture and the prison camps at which they are confined.

The list was furnished to the Spanish embassy at Berlin, which forwarded it to the American legation at Bern, Switzerland. According to cablegrams received here June 4 from the International Red Cross, Sergeant Hitchcock, reported below as confined at Saarbrücken, has been transferred to Camp Giessen.
