

# 110 NAMES ON U. S. CASUALTY LISTS REPORTED TODAY

General Pershing today reported 81 American Expeditionary Forces' casualties, divided as follows: Killed in action, 8; died of wounds, 10; died of disease, 1; severely wounded, 48; wounded slightly, 2; wounded (degree undetermined), 2; missing in action, 10.

Twenty-nine casualties in the marines attached to the American Expeditionary Forces were announced today at Marine Corps Headquarters, divided as follows: Two died from wounds received in action, one wounded severely in action, and 26 missing in action.



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## INTERNAL REVENUE EXCEEDS ESTIMATE MADE BY CONGRESS

Daniel Roper, Internal Revenue Commissioner, announces the collection of \$3,672,000,000 in his department for the year ended July 30, last, against \$300,000,000 for the previous year. The amounts exceed the estimate of Congress which looked for an income of \$3,400,000,000. The cost to the Government for making these collections was \$12,000,000. The commissioner says that the bureau's force of 4,000 employees has been doubled during the year.
