## FOE FLYERS KILL 54 GIRL WORKERS

THE HAGUE, July 10.—Fifty-four girl workers were killed when German airplanes made an afternoon raid on an ambulance station at La Panne, Belgium, according to a dispatch from Flushing today.  
More than fifty bombs were dropped.

La Panne is on the North Sea coast, about seven miles back of the allied lines.

## CZECHO-SLOVAKS TAKE IMPORTANT RAILWAY JUNCTION

Reports reflecting the turbulent conditions existing in Russia continued to reach the State Department today. A dispatch from the American consul at Vladivostok, under date of July 7, stated that on July 5 Czecho-Slovaks took the town of Nikolai, losing forty killed and 290 wounded in the fighting. Nikolai is about eighty miles west of Vladivostok.  
The Czecho-Slovaks were opposed by troops of the Red Guard, armed German prisoners, and Hungarians. The Red Guard, with an ammunition train and artillery retreated in the direction of Habarovsk, which is 800 miles north of Vladivostok. The retreating forces took practically all the railway rolling stock from Nikolai, their forces filling eight trains.

**Aid Czecho-Slovaks.**  
According to the dispatch, the population of Nikolai appeared very friendly to the Czecho-Slovaks, and rendered valuable assistance in making repairs to the railways damaged by the Red Guard. The victorious forces took 600 Hungarian prisoners, the dispatch adds, who are being held under guard until it is determined whether they were under arms. Bolsheviks are reported to have hanged several city officials and railroad employees who refused to give assistance.  
The President today conferred with Madame Botchkarova, leader of the famous Russian women's "battalion of death."

The problem of the Russian mission's personnel is rapidly being worked out, according to indications today. In so far as it is possible, the business men on it will be selected from those who have built up a friendly trade with Russian merchants and who are known in Russia.

**Murmansk Aid Allies.**  
The Murmansk population has officially separated from the Bolshevik government there, and has sided with entente troops in that vicinity, according to State Department dis-

## CALIFORNIAN GIVES UNCLE SAM A \$5 BIRTHDAY PRESENT

One way in which a gift can be made to the Government by one of its citizens has been found by a San Francisco man.  
The law does not permit the acceptance by Uncle Sam of gratuities. But William Romaine, of 2821 Jackson street, San Francisco, succeeded in giving his "Uncle" a birthday present on July 4, which will not be returned. He purchased a \$5 postage stamp, canceled it, and sent it to the Postmaster General with the following letter:  
"Dear Uncle Sam: Many, many happy returns of your birthday. May you live long and prosperous in the wish of one of your California sons, 'WILLIAM ROMAINE.'"  
The following reply was mailed Mr. Romaine today:  
"Dear Sir: The Postmaster General has referred to me your letter of July 1, with a \$5 postal stamp attached, which you have canceled as a birthday gift to 'Uncle Sam.' Permit me to express the appreciation of the Department of this very patriotic gift."  
"A. M. Dockery, Third Assistant Postmaster General."

## TWO CITIES TAKEN BY CZECH FORCES

AMSTERDAM, July 10.—Czech forces have occupied Syran and Moselin, a Berlin dispatch announces.  
Syran and Moselin are near the Volga river, about 300 miles southeast of Nijni-Novgorod, and are more than 4,000 miles from Nikolai, in Asiatic Russia, which other Czech forces are reported to have captured.

## MARTIAL LAW IN TEHRAN, PERSIA

Martial law has been declared in Tehran, Persia, following food riots and general disorders, according to cables to the State Department.

## FIVE ALLIED AEROS BOMB TURK CAPITAL

LONDON, July 10.—Five allied airplanes bombed Constantinople Sunday, according to a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam.  
Considerable damage was caused in the Turkish capital by the raid.

## ROUMANIAN ARMY WILL DEMOBILIZE

PARIS, July 10.—The Roumanian army will be reduced to its peace time strength, dating from July 14, said a dispatch from Berne today.

When Roumania was forced into a separate peace by the central empires, following the Brest-Litovsk treaty, one of the stipulations of Germany was that the Roumanian army be demobilized to minimum strength.

## CROWDS SEE ARCHBISHOP DOUGHERTY ENTHRONED

PHILADELPHIA, July 10.—Archbishop Denis J. Dougherty was enthroned this morning in the Cathedral of St. Paul and St. Peter as the head of the archdiocese of Philadelphia. He succeeds the late Archbishop Prendergast.  
Thousands crowded the streets around the cathedral, unable to gain entrance without admission cards, when the procession moved from the chapel at 9:30 o'clock.  
Cardinal Gibbons, primate of the American hierarchy; Archbishop Dougherty, the Rt. Rev. Michael J. Hoban, bishop of Scranton; the Rt. Rev. Thomas J. Shahan, bishop of Germantown; and rector of the Catholic University of America, and monsignori and members of religious secular clergy took part in the procession.

## STABBED IN FIGHT ON ANACOSTIA CAR

In a near riot among passengers on an Eleventh street car while it was crossing the Anacostia bridge early today, Frank Clark, nineteen years old, of Congress Heights, D. C. was stabbed on the right arm. He was taken to the Garfield Hospital, and after the stab wound was dressed, he returned to his home.  
A number of colored men and women got on the car near Green Willow Park, and as the car was passing over the bridge, a general fight started. In the melee Clark was cut. Razors were wielded about in careless fashion, and when a riot call was sent to the Fifth precinct and police arrived, the colored men who figured in the disturbance had disappeared.  
Clark is believed to be the only one injured.

## CUBAN PRESS AGENT SUES ON CONTRACT

NEW YORK, July 10.—J. W. Knight, director of the former republic of Cuba News Bureau in this city, who claims that he acted as the press agent for President Menocal, of Cuba, and the Cuban conservative party, has brought suit, alleging breach of contract and asking an accounting.  
One trouble, Mr. Knight explained, was that the Cuban executive had too many press agents. Former President Gomez, now in this city, has been subpoenaed as a witness, and the plaintiff says that there will be "revelations of unwritten history." The news bureau quit about six months ago.
