4,000,000 MEN TO BE SHIFTED SOON TO ESSENTIAL JOBS

Federal transfer of workmen from non-essential to war work will begin August 1. It is believed that before many months have passed, 4,000,000 workmen will change jobs.

With the beginning of next month the Labor Department will institute the central labor recruiting service, which will open offices in every city in the country.

The work of rating industries as to their need in the successful prosecution of the war got under way on Friday when a meeting of representatives of every governmental department concerned with production of war supplies was held.

Classification Plan. That the classification of industries will follow closely the order established by the Priorities Board of the War Industries Board was clearly indicated when the meeting recessed.

One prominent official said: "We will make great progress in organizing American labor for war work, if for no other reason than that it is now agreed by every member of the Labor Department that there is a great shortage of labor for war industries."

It is our hope that through bringing the message of the nation's great needs to the workmen of America that we can through our labor recruiting bureaus obtain the registration of all men needed in the special work which must be done.

On the other hand, it is always possible that the Government may move for raising the draft age. By raising the draft age we would at once obtain the registration of the workmen we seek.
