

BABY AND OTHERS  
HURT IN ACCIDENTS  
IN CITY STREETS

Three-year-old Charles F. Wyley, Jr., 3321 Eighteenth street northwest, is suffering from painful injuries received when an automobile his father was operating overturned at First street and Florida avenue northwest last night. The accident occurred when Mr. Wyley avoided a crash with a speeding automobile.

Four other persons were hurt in street accidents. M. A. Pottenger, fifty years old, of the Metropolitan Hotel, suffered a fractured collar bone when he was knocked down by a car of the Capital Traction Company at Eleventh street and Pennsylvania avenue northwest. He is at the Emergency Hospital.

Aged Man Hurt. While riding a bicycle on Massachusetts avenue near Third street northeast, Louis T. Farabee, seventy-five years old, a clerk in the Pension office, 313 East Capitol street, was struck by a motorcycle operated by Kenneth Ward, 1441 East Capitol street, and thrown to the street, receiving injuries to his hip. He was taken to the Casualty Hospital, 22 Q street northwest, where he is at the Emergency Hospital.

Colored Men in Smash-Up. Lewis Jones, colored, twenty-one years old, 1028 Eleventh street northwest, was injured when an auto truck, operated by Joseph Dickens, also colored, 160 W street northwest, was struck by an automobile driven by Meredith Green, colored, 1610 V street northwest, in Beach drive, Rock Creek Park.
