**Grace La Rue Files Suit.**

After a more or less spectacular and sensational career with George Byron Chandler as her husband, Grace La Rue, a Washington favorite, who has been appearing here each year for many seasons, is seeking a divorce in the courts at Amsterdam, N. Y.

When the actress and her husband appeared yesterday in supreme court, Chandler declared that he was not legally separated from his first wife at the time he paid court to Miss La Rue. He therefore said he considered his marriage to her invalid.

Miss La Rue married Chandler in 1909, a month after the latter was divorced by his wife, who was Miss Grace Fischer, of Brooklyn. Miss La Rue previously had been married to E. J. Murphy, her dancing partner in vaudeville.

Ten years ago Chandler was familiarly known as "Broadway's Millionaire Kid."

Four years ago, when Miss La Rue came to this country to sue for divorce, a reconciliation was effected. At that time Chandler declared that "he makes a mistake who marries an actress."

Chandler said that the breaking point in their relations four years ago came when Miss La Rue came home at 4 o'clock one morning and gave him an explanation that caused him to seek other quarters.

There has been no open break between Turkey and Germany, according to the best advices reaching this city today. The friction between the two countries is increasing, it is stated, but up to the present time there has been nothing approaching an open break.

Turkey has served notice on Germany that she will not consent to German control of Tiflis and the Baku region on the Caspian sea, which contains some of the richest oil fields in the world, but negotiations designed to settle this controversy have been halted as the result of the death of Hakkı Pasha, the Turkish ambassador to Berlin.

In the friction between Turkey and Germany, officials see possibilities that will be of great assistance to the allies. However, it is not anticipated that there will be any developments in the immediate future. It has been rumored several times that Turkey had been "feeling out" Italy through a neutral power on the question of a separate peace. But these rumors have never been verified, and are generally discredited.

# FRUIT GROWERS ARE MAKING GOOD PROFIT ON PEACHES

HAGERSTOWN, Md., July 31.—With only about half of the usual crop of peaches in the South Mountain fruit belt in this section of Maryland this year, fruit growers are getting excep-

tional prices for their peaches in Baltimore, Washington and other large cities. Peaches laid down in these cities are bringing \$4 a bushel, netting the growers between \$2.75 and \$3.00 a bushel. These prices are in striking contrast with prices of recent years. Last season growers only netted about \$1.50 a bushel on their peaches, while two years ago the fruit they shipped barely paid the freight charges to the cities.

Early shipments of apples from the fruit belt are heavy, as the crop is large. Ten carloads of transparent apples have just been shipped by Lancelot Jacques from Midvale to eastern and mid-western cities.

# SPAIN IS AROUSED OVER SINKING OF VESSEL BY U-BOAT

PARIS, July 31.—The press of Spain is aroused over the sinking of the Spanish steamer Ramon de Larrington by a German submarine, and several editorials have appeared saying that it is the gravest incident that has occurred between Germany and Spain since the beginning of the war, says a Madrid dispatch.

According to the dispatch, eight Spaniards perished in the disaster, and the cargo of petroleum on board was destroyed. The steamer last reported at an American port on May 23. She was a vessel of 2,375 tons.

# GIANTS COMMAND UNITS IN NEWEST NEGRO INFANTRY

CAMP MEADE, Md., July 31.—Officers of the 88th Infantry have not been picked for their size, but it happens nearly every one chosen for the line so far is about six feet tall. The officers of this new colored regiment are men of commanding appearance. The other colored infantry regiment here had colored officers, but in this one all commissions will be held by white men. Although the organization is still far from complete, it has been pushed with rapidity.

Col. H. L. Kinnison, the commander, and his adjutant, Capt. Francis W. Hughes, are not large men, although near enough to six feet to hold their ground in the presence of the taller officers and the hundreds of equally tall negroes. When the time comes for reviews the outfit will be in its glory.

The colored men of this outfit are being carefully picked with the idea of giving up to the reputation for good behavior and soldierly bearing made by the 388th Infantry and the 368th artillery, now in France, with the Ninety-second division, a colored division. An effort to get colored men of education who may be in good positions to join as a matter of patriotism before being called has met with success. More of such men will be welcomed.

Among the Washington officers of this regiment are Colonel Kinnison, the commander; First Lieut. Carmel K. Cummings; Second Lieut. Albert M. Duvall; Second Lieut. Hamilton F. Green; Major Daniel H. Torrey, and First Lieut. Roy Layton.

# LOYOLA COLLEGE HEAD WILL SOON LEAVE BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE, July 31.—Because of the ruling of the new code of canon law that a superior in a religious house must relinquish his post after six years, the Rev. William J. Ennis, S. J., president of Loyola College, will leave in a few days for New York, where he has been appointed by the provincial, the Rev. Anthony J. Maas, assistant pastor of the Jesuit Church

of St. Ignatius, the largest parish in New York.

Father Ennis will be succeeded by the Rev. Joseph A. McEneaney, who has been assistant rector of Woodstock College, Woodstock, Md., for the past ten years. The new president of Loyola was born in New York and entered the Society of Jesus at the novitiate, then located at Frederick, Md., twenty-five years ago. He made his course in philosophy at Woodstock, and after four years of regency spent at Boston College was ordained by Cardinal Gibbons in 1905 after completing the Jesuit course of theology at Woodstock. For two years Father McEneaney taught at St. Peter's College, Jersey City. When seen at Loyola yesterday Father McEneaney stated that he had not contemplated any change in the policies of Father Ennis and that he hoped to continue the successful work of his predecessor.

The Rev. Richard A. Fleming, secretary of the board of directors of Loyola College, composed of five

Jesuit members of the faculty—Fathers Rosand, O'Carroll, Fleming, Swinge, and Geale—said that the board and Father Ennis were annoyed by the irresponsible and fiducious statement that the retirement of Father Ennis from the presidency of Loyola was due to friction.

**MARSHALL HEADS WAR LORDS** AMSTERDAM, July 31.—Official confirmation has reached here of the appointment of Maj. Gen. Baron Marshall to be chief of the Kaiser's military cabinet. He succeeds Lieut. Gen. Baron Moritz von Lyncker, who retired because of ill-health. The new chief has been a member of the military cabinet for some time. He was one time aid-de-camp to General de Langendorff.
