

YOUTH OF AMERICA ACCUSES LEADERS OF G. O. P.

Utterances of Will H. Hays, chairman of the Republican national committee, and other Republican leaders, indicate all too plainly that some Republicans find it difficult to think outside of the realm of politics, according to Joseph P. Tumulty, secretary to President Wilson.

Mr. Tumulty was replying to Mr. Hays' letter denying he had said to Republican state chairman in Chicago that Democratic leaders at Washington "would end the war with any kind of compromise that would insure continuance of the Democratic party in power." Mr. Tumulty had asked Mr. Hays if he used the words quoted.

Chairman Hays' answer was a denial and an appeal to keep "partisan ship out of the war and the war out of partisan politics."

What Hays Did Say. Mr. Hays wrote that he discussed with the State chairman at Chicago "in a general way the lengths to which the Democratic leaders are going in their efforts to control the Senate and House, and also as to the irrevocable stand of the Republican party for a more prosecution of the war and against an inconclusive peace."

"I did not use the words quoted in your telegram," said Mr. Hays. "What I said then, which I now reaffirm, and which I continue to declare, was substantially as follows: 'First, as to the measure resorted to by certain Democratic leaders to get votes, I said: 'In the special election in Wisconsin, the Democratic machine leaders published advertisements, addressed to the soldiers at Camp Grant, as follows: 'President Wilson, your commander-in-chief, desires all loyal Americans to vote for Joseph E. Davies for United States Senator. 'Davies' selection means joy to Washington and Berlin. 'Davies' defeat means gloom to Washington and joy at Berlin.'"

Secretary Tumulty wrote Chairman Hays: "The general trend of your letter still leaves doubt in my mind as to the responsiveness of some of the Republican managers to the clearly implied desire of the American people to keep politics out of the war. While the whole thought of President Wilson has been given to the successful prosecution of the war, the foremost leaders of the Republican party, including yourself and Senator Penrose, have been making fervent arguments in favor of the restoration of the old political control of the nation. 'The President's war aims have been the aim of all the nations fighting against the German government. These aims have been stated unequivocally by the President upon a number of occasions since the war began. Not merely to American people, but all the world is familiar with these aims, which assure force without stint until victory is achieved. 'It is only through the subtle insinuations that characterize the politics that these aims might be diluted with any doubt. It is quite obviously partisan and gratuitous for you to refer to the imperious necessity of a vigorous prosecution of the war and a conclusive peace only, and the need of a Republican Congress to that end.'"

YACHT RESCUES CREW AT ATLANTIC PORT, Sept. 13.—Fifty members of the United States supply ship Montanan, which was torpedoed off the French coast on the evening of August 15, have arrived here. They stated that eighty-one of the eighty-six members of the Montanan were rescued by a yacht, formerly the property of one of New York's wealthiest men. Four of the crew were drowned, and one was killed by the explosion of the torpedo. Members of the crew believe that destroyers convoying the Montanan succeeded in sinking the U-boat which attacked their boat.

D. C. BOY DESCRIBES NIGHT IN DUGOUT. John S. Wynne, a Washington boy, who went to England last January to join the American expeditionary forces so that he might get to the front without the usual training on this side, in a letter to his father, Robert J. Wynne, says that in one sector the Germans retreated so fast that the Americans could not advance in time to get their artillery into action.

Young Wynne's letter describes a night's rest while in reserve. His letter follows: "A night's rest while in reserve is a nightmare. One just begins to doze in the dugout when the sirens and rattles sound off. Fritz is beginning a gas attack. Finally the 'gas-clear' signal is given, you sink back on the hard ground and your bones gradually adjust themselves to the hard earth. Then another alarm of bells—enemy airplanes approaching. A few bombs are dropped, and again you attempt to sleep when a few heavy artillery shells break over you. Pretty soon it is dawn and you are up and about your duties for the day. 'But it is all right and we are going to win. You and I will have some good times together again, so cheer up, dad.'"

SERGT. COST'S HOME IS HOLE IN GROUND. Living conditions behind the front lines are described in a letter received today by Page McK. Etchison, religious director of the Y. M. C. A., from Sgt. A. Boone Cost, a former Army yard employee who is now in France with the 109th U. S. Infantry. "My present home," reads the letter, "is a hole in the ground just long enough and wide enough to contain my body and deep enough to get me below the surface of the ground. This may not strike you as being a very comfortable home, but when the shells are falling around, throwing shrapnel in all directions, it is a mighty nice place to duck into. 'We are a few miles behind the front lines, in reserve. We are ready and expecting a call up to the front at any time, to be used as support. 'Even now as I write this, shells are falling all around. It looks as though I will have to beat a hasty retreat to my 'home.' We have had several raids from airplanes. They have dropped bombs around us, but so far have hurt no one. 'We have driven the Germans back so fast that their manner of going has not been at all particular. We suffer no illusions as to what may still lie before us, but nevertheless, the future looks about as bright as home, I know, are rejoicing over our present victories, for I know from personal experience that they are true.'"

"A. B. C." WILL HELP IN PAPER SAVING. The audit bureau of circulation, the organization representative of newspaper publishers, advertisers, and advertising agencies, today offered to the Government the service of its entire force in the work of supervising and distributing rightly the available supply of print paper. The offer was made to Thomas E. Donnelly, chief of the pulp and paper division of the War Industries Board, through a committee which included Edward S. Babcock, president of the bureau, and Stanley Clague, managing director. It was gratefully accepted by Mr. Donnelly. The general curtailment of the use of white paper by all periodicals, under direction and order of the Government, has brought about a vast amount of clerical and auditing work, and to this task the audit bureau brings a corps of men specially trained and experienced.

ITALY INDORSES JUGO-SLAV PLANS. PARIS, Sept. 13.—The Italian cabinet, according to reliable information from Rome, as a result of two important cabinet meetings, have decided to inform the allied governments that the Italian government considers the movement afoot among the Jugo-Slav peoples for obtaining their independence and for establishing a free state as corresponding with the principles for which the allies are fighting and with the final ends of a just and lasting peace.

FOR UNIFORMS AT COST. Congressman Walter W. Magee, of New York, has introduced a bill providing that naval officers and midshipmen at the Naval Academy shall have their uniforms furnished by the Government at cost. An amendment giving army officers this privilege was incorporated in the army bill, which recently became law.
