KILLED OVER 92 CENTS
 A brawl over the payment of a debt of 92 cents resulted in the death of George Johnson, colored. Early this morning, Lewis Washington, also colored, surrendered to the police, claiming that he shot and killed Johnson in self-defense in the altercation which occurred last Sunday night in Green's court. Washington says that he tried to collect the money from Johnson, and that blows were struck. He said Johnson threatened to kill him, and he admitted pulling a pistol from his pocket and shooting the other negro. James Marshall, colored, of 1332 W street northwest, died last night at the Casualty Hospital from a stab wound, which the police say was inflicted during an altercation on August 28 by Jane Briscoe, also colored. The woman has been arrested, and is held awaiting the action of Coroner Nevitt.

BRITAIN'S WOMEN ON JOB EN MASS
 Extent of the increase in the employment of women and girls in Great Britain is shown by figures which are set forth in the monthly labor review of the Department of Labor. These figures, obtained from the British Labor Gazette, show that 4,741,000 women and girls were employed in January, 1918, as against 3,275,000 in July, 1914.
 The figures do not show the number of women and girls in domestic service, nor do they take into account the large movement from domestic service as well as from small dressmaking workshops and workrooms to other occupations.
1,442,000 in Men's Jobs.
 Direct replacements of men by women total 1,442,000. Here again, the figures do not relate to domestic service or the movement from domestic service and small dressmaking workshops and workrooms to other occupations.
 Attention is called to the fact that figures relating to the number of women employed in such services as the Women's Royal Naval Service, the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps, the Women's Police, and timber cutting under the Board of Trade, are not included, nor are they available. Some indication of the large number of women employed in these services may be gathered from the statement made in the House of Commons in February, 1918, that over 20,000 women had enrolled in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps.
In Scope of Survey.
 The total of nearly 5,000,000 women and girls which are referred to in the figures, include those in industries, government establishments, public utilities, agriculture, finance and banking, commerce, professions, hotels, theaters, and the like, in the civil service of the postoffice, in other civil service, and in other services under local authorities.
 The labor review says that in almost all the industries in Great Britain the field of women's work has been extended since the outbreak of the war. Broadly speaking, the conclusions as to the value of the labor of women are favorable, although employers differ widely in their opinions.
 Much less labor difficulty is encountered with women than with men.

NAVY MAN A HERO
 Another American hero in the person of Lieut. Elbert Walker Shirk, U. S. Naval Reserve Forces, is honored today by special mention in the reports of the Navy Department. Lieutenant Shirk hails from Richmond, Indiana, where his wife, Mrs. Mary T. Shirk now resides.

CAMP MEADE NEEDS 2,000 LABORERS

CAMP MEADE, MD., Sept. 12.—Two thousand laborers are needed at once to work on the big \$6,000,000 signal corps camps now in course of construction at Kelly's Crossing, within the Meade reservation, for the biggest signal corps school in the world, which is urgently needed by the War Department. There are 3,500 men on the job at present, but only 800 laborers are included in this number.
 Major R. A. Dennell, the constructing quartermaster, is the same Dennell who made English contractors sit up and take notice when he built the Liverpool board of trade building in half the time they said it would require and quoted the lowest bid that was submitted. He gave the Norwegians a little lesson in efficiency when he went there after alone required at about twice as fast as they put up important buildings for the American Expeditionary forces.
 Speed was never more urgent than now on this job. About 1,000 student signalmen are to be sent here as soon as the camp is in readiness. It is not unlikely that many will come from the 32 to 45 year classes, just registered, as men are needed who have had technical or other experience of a kind valuable in signal work.

HARRIS IS VICTOR

ATLANTA, Sept. 12.—Unofficial returns from all but sixteen counties in Georgia give William J. Harris, former chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, a substantial lead in the popular vote in the Democratic primary to name a successor to United States Senator Thomas W. Hardwick, who is charged by President Wilson of being disloyal to the present Administration.
 Harris had a lead over his nearest

opponent by 24,707 votes and 25,031 ahead of William Shelley Howard, Congressman from the Fifth district. Returns so far indicate that all Congressmen have been renominated except J. R. Walker, of the Eleventh district, who has been defeated by Judge W. C. Lankford, of Nashville. Carl Vinson has defeated Tom Watson by a close vote.


