## CONFEREES DELAY FOOD BILL ACTION

House and Senate conferees on the food production bill, which includes the Pomerene amendment for a rental administration in the District of Columbia, have put over until tomorrow action on this amendment. They are divided in opinion whether the question of rent charges in a bill which relates to food production in the District should be treated in a bill which relates to food production. Senator Kenyon took the lead in urging that it was important that action be taken and that unless there was action in connection with the food bill, the District tenants would get no relief.

**Majority Favor Passage.**  
 The majority of the House conferees, though admitting that legislation relating to rentals here ought to be passed, feel that it ought not to be hitched to the food production measure.

If the conferees do decide to act on the question of profiteering in rentals here, there are indications they will take the Pomerene amendment as a basis of operations and evolve a more drastic measure.

Chairman Lever, of the House conferees, who has conferred with Chairman Bea, Johnson, of the District Committee of the House about the need for profiteering legislation and the situation here, is not satisfied with the Pomerene amendment.

If the conferees do decide to deal with profiteering, they may take testimony about the conditions in the District.

power to change it, as both houses had agreed to it. Some talk was current that the conferees would change the dry amendment so as to permit the importation of foreign wines up to next May 1, the date when manufacture of domestic wine and beer is prohibited under the amendment. But the conferees concluded this was beyond their authority. This means the dry amendment is not a subject of further conference.

There was some speculation among the conferees whether the President would veto the food production bill because of the dry amendment, or rather because the House failed to modify the dry amendment as the State Department requested because of the requests of Italy, France and other foreign governments. The general impression was that the measure would not be vetoed.

The pure feed amendment is another important amendment which was put over until Monday. This is of the widest interest to stockmen, millers and grain men.

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## 18 FLOUR MILLS LICENSES REVOKED

Licenses of the David Scott Flour Mills, Incorporated, Detroit Mich. have been revoked until further notice for failure to keep proper records and render correct reports representing the company's actual business transactions. The revocation becomes effective October 5. The Food Administration announced today that proofs that the company's records were faulty was produced at a hearing conducted by David H. Heinenan, county food administrator for Wayne county, Mich. This hearing was held September 12.

The company's main office is at Detroit. It also has plants at Schenectady, Amsterdam, Troy, and Albany N. Y.; Biddford, Portland, Westbrook, Calais, Bangor, and Old Town Me.; Lawrence, Mass.; Manchester Dover, Somersworth, Rochester Nashua, and Portsmouth, N. H.

## TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS

By educating workmen, industrial accidents can be largely prevented according to C. W. Price, field secretary of the National Safety Council. Mr. Price says: "Education of the workman has prevented about 88 per cent of the accidents usual in certain plants. About one-third can be prevented by mechanical provisions. The manager and superintendent of a plant must believe thoroughly in the safety first movement; foremen also must uphold it." It is pointed out that in every plant there should be a man who has studied safety methods and has power to apply them. Mr. Price declares also that every plant should tell by word and picture on a bulletin board all minor accidents and that a committee of workmen should be appointed to investigate and report on all accidents.

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


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
