WOMAN KILLED IN FALL DOWN STAIRS

Mrs. Mary Martin, forty-five years
old, 1516 Gales street northeast, an
employee of the Treasury Department,

pital today.

years old, 1440 W street southeast, was
slightly injured last night, when the
motorcycle he was riding collided
with an automobile at Ninth and D
streets northwest.

An automobile operated by R. L.
Johnson, 915 Westminister street
northwest, collided with a motorcycle
operated by Ruppert Gregory, of 1118
North Carolina avenue southeast, at
Eighteenth and M streets northwest
yesterday. Gregory was slightly in-
jured.

CAPTIVE BRAZILIAN SUNK WITH U-BOAT

BOSTON, Oct. 15.—A German sub-
marine sunk by a British man-of-war
which answered the call of the Bra-
zilian steamship Guaratuba had on
board Capt. Mario Hinoos, commander
of the Brazilian vessel. He went
down with the U-boat.

Sixty-five members of the crew
were picked up by the warship. The
Guaratuba was formerly a German
steamer. Captain Hinoos had been
taken prisoner by the U-boat com-
mander.

COMPULSORY LOAN MEASURE PUSHED

MELBOURNE, Oct. 15.—A second
reading of the measure in the house
of representatives which makes subscrip-
tions to war loans compulsory has been
moved. The measure applies to any
shortage in voluntary subscriptions.

Persons whose incomes are under
£250 are exempted under the bill. Sol-
diers and sailors who have served out-
side Australia are exempt to the extent
of their income from personal exertion.
The measure applies to pending and fu-
ture loans.

REDEEM W. S. S. PLEDGES

Washingtonians who signed pledges for
the regular purchase of War Savings
Stamps each month and who have over-
looked the prompt redemption of those
pledges, are urged to do so at once.
Immediately after the close of the Lib-
erty Loan campaign, a plan for follow-
ing up each of these pledges will be put
into effect, not only in the District, but
throughout the country as well.

These pledges were received in con-
nection with the W. S. S. drive last
June, and the totals were reported to
the Treasury Department, where they
were used as a basis for calculation in
planning war finance. A report of cash
sales from month to month indicates a
failure in some quarters of pledges to
live up to their written promises,
threatening the disarrangement of the
Treasury's plans, and to avert this, a
"follow-up" campaign will be launched.

CHINESE REVOLT GROWS

PEKING, Oct. 15.—Advice here in-
dicates that the movement instituted
against President Hsu Shin-Chang by
the military government in Canton is
gaining headway in the south.

News of the resignation of Tuan
Chi-jui as premier of the cabinet has
also been received. Chin-Hun-Hsun,
former minister of the interior, has
succeeded.

War against President Hsu was of-
ficially declared by the southern govern-
ment last week. He was declared to
have been elected by a bogus parlia-
ment.

LUTHERANS TO UNITE

Union of the more than forty syn-
odical organizations and the three
general synods of the Lutheran
Church in the United States will be
considered at a conference of
church representatives in New York,
November 14.

A complete constitution for the
government of the new church society
and its boards has been prepared and
adopted by all the synods. The con-
stitution, the church leaders believe,
reflects the faith and spirit of Luthe-
rianism.

FRANCE TO BUILD SHIPS

PARIS, Oct. 15.—Plans of the
French under secretary of state of the
merchant marine for doubling the
bearing strength of the mer-
chant marine were announced by
Pernand Boulissier. The first part of
the work includes building vessels
representing a ship tonnage of 1,500-
600 tons. He will ask for an appro-
priation of 2,000,000,000 francs.

RECORDS TO BE GUIDE

Commissions in the judge advocate
general's department of the army will
hereafter be made after investigation
by the department of court records.
Suitable material will be found in
this manner, instead of by constant
personal calls from the applic-
ants. It was explained that the new
method is made necessary by the in-
creasingly large number of applica-
tions being received.

KAISER GRANTS AMNESTIES

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 15.—The Kaiser
has granted amnesty to a great number
of persons, who have been under arrest
charged with political and military of-
fenses. It was learned here, in reports
from Berlin.
