

WAR WORK DRIVE NOV. 1.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—In spite of the influenza epidemic, the week of November 1 to 15, originally set for the United War Work Drive, will be adhered to, according to an announcement today by Dr. John H. Mott, director general of the United War Work Council. This decision was reached after careful consideration and conferences with President Wilson and members of the War Department.

130 MILLIONS FOR ARMY MOTOR CARS

The War Department has announced how the new motor transport corps will be fitted out when the \$130,000,000 contract is fulfilled.

Some of the equipment will be 800 three- and one-half-ton trucks; 202 two-ton trucks; 600 five-ton chassis; 1,350 three-ton chassis; 2,100 two-ton chassis; 465 one- and one-half-ton chassis; and 4,800 military.

In addition, 1,200 AA chassis have been ordered and 34,000 Class B chassis, for which the Government will furnish the eleven major units. Contracts have been placed for 3,584 ten-ton trailers and 190 four-wheel trailers and orders have been placed for 13,800 four-wheel drives that will be handled as amendments to ordinance contracts.

Other orders include 8,000 standard five-passenger Ford, 1,000 five-passenger Dodge cars, 500 Dodge winter cars, 150 limousines, 3,800 delivery cars, 18,775 motorcycles, and 28,000 bicycles.

ALLIED LEADERS DECORATED BY U. S.

Acting as President Wilson's personal representative, General Pershing will today present the American distinction service medal to Marshal Foch, Marshal Joffre, Marshal Halp, General Petain, General Disa, and General Gillian. General Pershing has also been awarded the same medal, which will be presented to him by Gen. T. H. Bliss, as representative of the President.

The Secretary of War has called General Pershing, as commander-in-chief of the army, today conferred the distinguished service medal on the American and allied military leaders, and asks that in presenting the medals to the heroes of our allies that you express to them the high regard of the people of the United States and of the American army for the distinguished and patriotic service that they have rendered to the common cause in which they have been associated on the battlefields of Europe.

In presenting the medal to General Pershing, General Bliss was directed to say to him that the President awarded the medal to the commander of our armies in the field as a token of the gratitude of the American people for his distinguished service and in appreciation of the success that our armies have achieved under his leadership.

DRYS MAY FORCE RENT LEGISLATION

Conferees on the food production bill, which involves prohibition and rent profiteering in the District, are expected to hold an early meeting to decide what to do about profiteering.

Some of the conferees want the whole matter shunted over until after election. On the other hand, the dry forces in both houses are growing more and more insistent that the food production bill be passed.

They threaten to howl over all opposition in the House and settle profiteering legislation themselves by adopting the Tamm amendment if there is much more delay.

They are apprehensive of the peace talk. They believe if peace should come suddenly, the proposed dry legislation might be left stranded.

Under this pressure there is more prospect for an agreement of some kind between the two houses on rent legislation for Washington than there has been for some time.

If a quorum of the House were present, and a roll call were forced, the dryes say the majority would vote to dispose of the food production bill, prohibition and profiteering quickly. But there is not a quorum present, and it would be difficult to get one to return to Washington.

"VET" COLLEGE CLOSES

Owing to war conditions, the George Washington University College of Veterinary medicine has closed.

The large number of enlistments of both students and faculty members in the military service, virtually depopulated the college. Dean Buckingham, recognizing the difficulty of obtaining instructors and also the impossibility of securing a large appropriation, decided to suspend operations for the period of the war.

In the past the college merely has been affiliated with the University. After the war it is likely that the college will be reopened and incorporated as a part of the university proper.

D. C. WAXING WEALTHY

Cash is flowing into the treasury of the District of Columbia today at a rate never equaled in the city's history.

According to the report of Auditor Alonso Tweedle, the total business passing through the auditor's office during the past year increased more than \$5,000,000 over the previous twelve months.

Cash receipts for the year amounted to \$17,877,915.04. The surplus of revenues over appropriations for the year was \$1,236,732.79, and the net indebtedness of the District was reduced \$864,032.70, leaving the net bonded indebtedness \$3,523,800.70.

MRS. BROWN DIVORCED

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Club circles here were stirred by the news from Reno that Mrs. William Grant Brown, one of New York's most prominent clubwomen, had been awarded a divorce on grounds of cruelty. She claimed her husband's complaints about her war activities, and would not speak to her for days.

The husband, who is a prominent lawyer, said his great mistake had been that he had played the part of a devoted lover instead of a cave man.


EDITORIAL

Send Useful Christmas Gifts to the Boys in France

Remember that they live in their packs and anything that can't be used immediately or easily carried, must be cast aside.

Regulations for Sending Gifts are as Follows:

- A—Soldier boy in France will mail a label to the person he wishes to have send the gifts to him.
- B—This label must be presented to the local Red Cross and you will receive the official carton for sending Xmas gifts—size 9x4x3.
- C—This box can be packed and then returned to the Red Cross for an O. K. before being mailed to the soldier boy. No package can weigh over three pounds, including carton, paper, etc.
- D—The above is an illustration of a carton packed by us. It weighs 2 pounds and 2 ounces. See it in our window. It contains—
- E—Fountain Pen.
- F—Indelible Pencil.
- G—Pair Wool Socks.
- H—Money Belt.
- I—Talcum Powder.


