PARIS, Oct. 30.—Formal protest against the carrying off of civilians of Laon has been sent Germany by the French government. It was stated that the repatriation of German civilians from France will be stopped unless the Laon citizens are returned immediately to the keeping of the French government.

She has brothers fighting in France, Italy, Turkey, Saloniki and Africa; one is in Scotland, another a prisoner in Germany, another at an unknown port, and one is fighting in the air.

Mrs. McKay's husband, Alexander McKay, the contractor, who built the Columbus Memorial, on the Union Station Plaza, now is awaiting his call in the last draft. The McKays have bonds of all the four Liberty loans and have given up half of their home to house war-workers. Here is what this family has done in the war: Harry Lilley, Jr., Mrs. McKay's nephew, enlisted in a Scottish bagpipe band, though only eleven years old, as soon as he heard that Harry, sr., his father, had been taken prisoner. He has seen service in France, but is now in England. Neal Lilley, Mrs. McKay's father, quartermaster on the British transport Caledonia, was killed in the fight which preceded its sinking by a U-boat. John Lilley, one of Mrs. McKay's brothers, chief petty officer on a British mine-sweeper, was killed while directing the destruction of a mine in the Irish sea. Harry Lilley, another of Mrs. McKay's brothers, is a prisoner in Germany. He was taken when the Germans captured a hospital, where he was under treatment for wounds received at Verdun. Francis Lilley, another brother, was severely wounded in the fighting on the Somme, when a shell fragment tore his foot, necessitating amputation. Thomas Lilley, another brother, lay in "No Man's Land" a day when he was first subjected to the poison gas of the Germans. He is in Africa. George Lilley, a veteran of the Boer war, is in General Allenby's army in Palestine. James Lilley, who also served

Baron Beaverbrook is a Canadian, and was official eyewitness with the Canadian troops on the front in France during 1915. FOE WANTS G.O.P. TO WIN, WARNS GERARD

That Germany would misinterpret a Republican victory in the coming elections was the claim of ex-Ambassador Gerard in a statement through the Democratic national committee today. "I know," he said, "that Germans cannot understand our political system; that if a Congress opposed to the President is elected they will believe again what they believed before we dared to war with them—that there is in the United States a great number of people favorable to the German cause, and opposed to the President and to war. And encouraged by this belief the military resistance of the people will again stiffen, and the favorable moment for the allies may pass. "I am sure of this, that were I opposed to every other policy of the President and were he my bitterest enemy, I should, nevertheless, beg the American people to support him at this fateful moment."

SAYS PAY-TRIOTISM IS G. O. P. DESIRE

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 30.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels, in an address here urging the return of a Democratic Congress in the election next Tuesday, said Republican politicians in their desire to get control of the Senate and House have forgotten their duty as Americans. They have raised false cries, he asserted, in the hope of getting the people to forget the one dominating issue. "Let the people know the secret of the big money reactionists are putting up to elect a Republican Congress. These men from Ferdinand are not thinking about patriotism, but pay-tributism. They are not thinking about securing permanent peace, or even about war. They are thinking about after the war, and they are straining every nerve to secure a Congress that will repeal or destroy the wholesome legislation and progressive steps which have marked Wilson's Administration. "It is not the plain voter of any party, his heart aflame with patriotic zeal, who has for weeks been playing politics with the gravest questions that ever confronted mankind. It is the Republican politician, who sometimes poses as a statesman, who has busied himself with raising false issues in order to try to get control of Congress. He is not pro-German. He simply has forgotten his duty as an American and dropped down to his lower plane as a partisan. Forgetting the weightiest matters, he beats the party tom-toms and raises ancient political catch phrases in the hope that the people can be made to forget the one dominating issue."

HAM PRICES JUMP

"Ham an" took another jump in price on the official fair price list of the District Food Administration today. Whole standard ham advanced from 39 to 40 cents a pound, while fancy ham jumped from 41 1/4 to 43 cents a pound. Select fresh eggs now cost 72 cents a dozen instead of 72, the price last week, while cold storage eggs moved up a cent, the retail cost now being 58 cents a dozen. Butter and lard showed a decrease, butter going from 69 to 65 cents a pound, while lard climbed down a cent, to 35 cents a pound.
