SUFFRAGISTS WEAR MOURNING BANDS

Suffragists yesterday adopted a new form of protest at the Capitol. With mourning bands around their arms to denote sorrow because their view of the state of democracy in this country they marched up and down in front of the Senate Office Building, six abreast, chanting:

Censures Republican Claims

The Republican party is strongly censured for attacks on the President by Senator Gerry. He states that the President has unmasked the attempts of Republicans to obtain control of Congress by claiming to be a good supporter of his administration.
