

GREEL CALLS CENSORSHIP OFF

George Greel, chairman of the Committee on Public Information, issued the following statement regarding censorship regulations today: "It has been agreed that there is no further necessity for the operation of the volunteer censorship under which the press has guarded from the enemy the military policies, plans, and movements of the United States. The agreement may be considered as no longer binding, and the card carrying the request of the Government is herewith canceled. The Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy, and all others concerned with the direction of America's war effort, join in sincere acknowledgment of the debt of gratitude owing to the press of the United States for the honorable discharge of a high responsibility. Without force of law, and under no larger compulsion than their own patriotism, the overwhelming majority of newspapers have given unflinching obedience to every desire of the Government in all matters of military secrecy, carrying through successfully a tremendous experiment in honor and trust."

NEW WOMAN JUDGE SUPPORTS FAMILY

ORLAND, Cal., Nov. 14.—Mrs. M. W. Thomas, write-in candidate against Willis Drew, whose name was on the ballot for the office of justice of the peace of Orland county, defeated her male opponent by 129 votes. The office pays \$75 per month. Mrs. Thomas is supporting her husband, who is an invalid. They own a small farm near this city, and Mrs. Thomas does the work of the house and the ranch. She has made regular trips to Orland for cordwood, piling it on the wagon, driving the team here, and unloading it at the door of the patron.

R.R. KEYMEN'S HEAD CALLS OFF STRIKE

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 14.—Siren-calls were being made early today to reach approximately 18,000 railroad telegraphers in the Southeast, instructing them not to strike this morning, according to O. D. Gorman, chairman of a committee of Southeastern Order of Railway Telegraphers' general chairman. "We have received information from Washington which warrants this move," was the only statement made by Gorman today.

HANDLEY-PAGE AERO LANDS HERE

For the first time in the history of military aviation the people of Washington have been able to see the Handley-Page bombing plane in action. The Handley-Page bomber carrying seven passengers arrived at Bolling field, Anacostia, at 2:55 p. m. yesterday. The plane was piloted by Capt. E. B. Waller, of the Royal Flying Corps. The plane left Mineola at 9:25 o'clock yesterday morning. It stopped at Silver, N. J., at 10:04 o'clock for gasoline. Leaving Silver at 12:37 o'clock it continued the flight to this city. The plane has a wing spread of 102 feet, weighs 14,000 pounds loaded, and has a capacity of 400 gallons of fuel. It is powered with two 400-horsepower motors.
