



U. S. ASKS BUILDING WORK BE RESUMED

Resumption of building activities throughout the nation received official sanction here last night. The Treasury Department, in a statement, lifted the ban on every kind of construction work and urged that it begin immediately. "The resumption of construction work will facilitate the industrial transition from war to peacetime basis," the statement explains. "It should serve to absorb labor as it turns from war work to peacetime pursuits."

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VICTORY JOY KILLED SPANISH INFLUENZA

The victory celebration killed the Spanish influenza. This is the opinion of high medical authority in Washington. It is admitted that suggestion may have had something to do with it, but it is contended that physiological rather than psychological reasons should receive the credit for rendering the disease germs innocuous. "The credit for the discovery of this fact belongs to a philosopher who is too modest to permit the disclosure of his identity. Standing in the Washington bureau of the Universal Service on November 8, when joyful mobs were making a bedlam of all outdoors, this philosopher uttered a mild protest at a suggestion to call off the celebration. 'Let them go on,' he said. 'They are doing themselves and the world in general a whole lot of good.' 'How?' he was asked. 'By killing the influenza,' he replied. Declares to Debate. "But," it was protested, "they are not killing but spreading it. Surgeon General Blue's most emphatic warning is to avoid crowds, and these people are rubbing shoulders by thousands, and sneezing and coughing in each other's faces between yells. Why, if the theories of the doctors are correct, hundreds of these shouters will develop pneumonia in a day or two?" The gentle philosopher declined to debate the point but on the following Monday, when the next outbreak was in progress, the philosopher returned to the bureau and to the attack. "This clinches it," he observed. "The influenza germs are getting a worse licking than the Germans got. This means annihilation for the germs."

YANKS LIBERATED FROM GERMAN PRISON CAMP

PARIS, Nov. 17.—More than 2,332 American prisoners in German camps were released immediately by the signing of the German armistice, according to the latest figures prepared by the American Red Cross in Switzerland. This number includes all the Americans captured to November 1. It is estimated that only a few hundred more Americans were captured after that date. Of the total number of prisoners to be released, 2,330 are army men; twelve are from the navy and 100 are civilians. In the camps were 241 army officers and 2,128 noncommissioned officers and privates, and three naval officers and nine sailors.

ONE SOLDIER'S VOTE MAKES TOWN WET

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 17.—If anybody else but a soldier had done it prohibitionists in the tight little town of Absecon, joyful a week ago today over the fact that the municipal party had voted itself "dry" by its exceedingly narrow but quite sufficient majority of 1, would be full of gloom and also resentful today. When the soldier votes were counted last night county registrars found in casting his ballot had marked an "X" in the license column of his ballot, capturing the dry victory at home and turning the gloom of the disappointed wet into rejoicing. Out of eight soldier votes from Hammonton, five voted "dry." Hammonton is safely in the dry belt.

1,203 JOBS WHERE LEGS DON'T COUNT

Recent surveys by the Red Cross Institute for Crippled and Disabled Men have brought out that the field open for re-establishment of such men in industrial life is much wider than probably is generally supposed. Investigation of 422 factories since January 1 last have revealed 1,203 kinds of jobs open to leg cripples and 278 open to arm cripples. Careful attention was given sanitary conditions and provisions for safety. The report describes in detail the processes involved in each industry investigated; the advantages and disadvantages of each for arm and leg cripples, respectively; the wages paid; the organization of the trade, and the general provisions for the safety of workers. The following industries are included: The shoe industry; the leather industry; the rubber industry; the paper-goods industry; the shoe industry; sheet-metal goods; the silk industry; cigar manufacture; drugs and chemicals; the candy industry; the celluloid industry; optical goods; and the motion-picture industry.

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DRAFT WORK WILL BE DISCONTINUED

Orders were issued last night by Provost Marshal General Crowder that all physical examination of draft registrants, all work of classification and of appeals shall be discontinued. The orders further direct that district boards shall proceed at once to complete all their records in so far as the records are now deficient as to men already classified. Warning was issued that the utmost care be used in protecting and preserving all records of district boards which are to await further orders regarding the ultimate custody and accounting of such records. While the directions to discontinue physical examinations were issued at the earliest possible completion of occupational and dependency classification of the nineteen to thirty-six and eighteen-year groups is reiterated in the order.

INDIAN PRINCESS TO SING FOR U. S. TROOPS

DENVER, Col., Nov. 17.—Princess Tsarina, daughter of the Muskege Indian chief and widely known throughout the West as a talented mezzo-soprano, is en route to Europe to sing for American soldiers. Thomas Evans, half brother of the princess, recently was killed in the battle of St. Mihiel.
