

145 U. S. VESSELS SUNK DURING WAR

During the entire European war the American merchant marine lost, from acts of the central powers, 145 vessels, of 254,460 gross tons, involving the loss of 775 lives.

Nineteen vessels were sunk previous to the entrance of the United States into the war, the losses from April 6, 1917, to November 11 last, being 128. The major destruction was caused by U-boats. In the four and a quarter years of the war 51 vessels of American registry were torpedoed and 87 sunk by running afoul of mines.

These figures are compiled by the Department of Commerce, and will be subject to slight change.

TO CONVERT SUB-CHASERS INTO LIGHT TENDERS

A peace time use has been found for a score or more of submarine chasers. Secretary Redfield, of the Department of Commerce, has placed a requisition for the Navy Department for U-boat chasers to be used in lighthouse and fisheries work.

Redfield said today that little rebuilding was necessary to convert the small boats into vessels of ideal size and equipment for service in tending light houses. The fisheries section of the department also can use the small craft for its work, Redfield said.

MAUDE ADAMS, VICTIM OF "FLU," IS RECOVERING

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 22.—Maude Adams, actress, who has been ill with influenza here for three weeks, has left for Boston, where she will remain until January 1 to recuperate.

She will make no public appearances until that time, her physician said before leaving today. Her company has gone to New York to take up other work until she is well again.

WELCOME ABROAD AWAITS PRESIDENT

LONDON, Nov. 22.—President Wilson is assured of the most cordial reception in every allied country, both from the people and from officials.

There are many evidences that the Executive head of the American republic would receive a welcome such as has never before been accorded a foreign dignitary. Receipt of the news that he definitely had decided personally to attend the coming peace conference served to make manifest the great respect and affection felt on this side for the man who so clearly has outlined the policies of the world's democracies in the war.

There is absolutely no spirit of criticism or jealousy in any of the nations with which the United States is associated in the war. All former hostility on account of America's tardy entrance into the conflict has been smothered in gratitude. Not only because of the republic's timely help, without which it is generally recognized the war would not have been won, but also because of Mr. Wilson's masterly handling of the conversations before the signing of the armistice.

The allies now not only trust the American Executive, but are depending on his counsel and advice, thoroughly appreciating his high-mindedness and his vision.

It is understood that while Mr. Wilson was considering the advisability of a trip to this side of the Atlantic, both Lloyd George and Clemenceau were urging him to come to the peace conference. It is believed his final decision was largely the result of their representations.

CHINA TO DESTROY OPIUM SUPPLY AT SHANGHAI

The Chinese government has decided to destroy 1,200 chests of opium purchased in Shanghai at a cost of \$14,000,000, according to a cable received at the Chinese legation here.

The Chinese government bought it with a view to using it gradually for medicinal purposes, but public opinion in China demanded its destruction so as to do away with the evil once for all.


ITALIAN DEPUTIES WILL GREET PRESIDENT WILSON
