

## D. C. MAN TELLS OF FIGHT AT VERDUN

Fighting in the victorious American drive at Verdun, Dead Man's Hill to the rear, fleeing Germans in front, Private Clarence Kuykendall, a Washington hero, was gassed and sent to a hospital.

Private Kuykendall, who is twenty-four years old, lives at 329 O street southwest. He was born in North Carolina but has lived in this city since 1909. He went to France on July 9 with Company K, 216th infantry, Seventy-ninth division. A letter to his father, N. A. Kuykendall, written on November 24, gives a graphic story of his experiences. He says: "I left the States on July 9. We sailed on the ship America from Hoboken, N. J., and had fine weather on the way over until the night of the 14th. The sea was running high and many of the boys were sick. At about 1 o'clock in the morning there was a tremendous crash. We were all ordered to don life belts. I could hear men in the water calling for help.

### Could Float Two Hours.

"When we reached the deck I heard one of the crew say that we would float for two hours, not longer. I found that a British tanker had tried to cross our bows and had been rammed. She sank in five minutes. We picked up nine of the crew.

"We landed at Brest on July 18, stayed there three days, then boarded a train, and three days later arrived at a little village called Voves. We hiked twelve miles to Chateauv, where we had six weeks' training, then from day to day we moved slowly up toward the front. We were ordered to the Verdun front.

"About September 18 my company went into the first line trenches. The trenches were knee deep in mud in places. Hill 204, Dead Man's Hill, and Death Valley were just to our rear.

"There were lots of rats, some of them as big as cats. One could not get any sleep because of them. If we had any extra bread we put it in our pockets and then had two jobs at once—to watch out for Fritz and to keep the rats out of our pockets.

### Thirty Feet Underground.

"We were relieved after five days and went back a few miles, where we occupied dugouts thirty feet underground. They were very cold and damp.

"The French had a lot of heavy artillery a few yards from the dugout. At about 3 o'clock on the morning of September 26 the French opened up with all their artillery, and for miles around there were guns of all sizes firing. The sky was bright from the fire.

"Just at 5 o'clock in the morning of the 26th we went over the top and drove the Germans, like sheep. We advanced all that day under machine gun fire, jumping from one shell hole to another. That night we stayed in the German trenches. I got a rifle, helmet, belt, and other souvenirs left by the Hun. We had so much to carry that I had to leave them behind.

### Go Through Barrage.

"We started again early next morning and didn't stop for anything, although we had to advance through the barrage and heavy machine gun fire. We lost men heavily. I lay with two other men in a shell hole for two hours. Every time we tried to get out we were driven back by machine gun fire.

"We finally got out by jumping from one shell hole to another. These shell holes vary in size from tin cans up to holes large enough to hold twenty men. Sometimes a shell lands in a hole full of men.

"There are always lots of aeroplanes overhead while a drive is going on. Often one would come close to the ground, flying at great speed, and would open up on the men with machine guns.

### Run Into Barrage.

"I did the best I could, dad, and stayed with the boys until about two days before they were relieved. We ran into a full barrage. The ground trembled from the force of the explosions. We were advancing through artillery, machine gun fire, sniping, aeroplane fire, and gas.

"I was gassed and got very sick. I was sent with several other wounded and gassed men to a dressing station in the rear. There I was treated and sent to an evacuating station where I stayed all night. The next day I was sent to a base hospital.

"The night I left the evacuating station it was raided by aeroplanes, which opened with machine gun fire on the wounded. I don't know whether I will be sent back to my company or back home, but don't worry about me, because I am getting along in great shape."

## GERMAN SOCIALISTS LACK COURAGE TO START REVOLT

THE HAGUE, Dec. 20.—A Hun revolt slated for November 4, which failed through lack of courage on the part of the Socialists, was revealed by George Ledebour in a speech to the soldiers' and workers' congress. Ledebour told how the revolution was planned in 1896 and assumed definite shape in 1916 to prepare for 1918. The authorities themselves helped by summoning everyone known as an Independent Socialist to the congress by which action regiments became revolutionaries.

According to the speaker, November 4 of this year was set as the date of the revolution, but even Ledebour himself did not have the courage to call it into being. Ledebour's attack on Premier Albert caused wild confusion.

PARIS, Dec. 20.—Miss Margaret Wilson, daughter of the American President, left Paris this morning for another concert tour.

Miss Wilson, who has been singing at entertainments all along the American front, has made a big hit with the soldiers, who are loud in their praise of her.

She willingly sacrificed her own Christmas plans, asking the entertainment branch of the Y. M. C. A. to send her to the point where they thought the doughboys might be most lonesome.
