

Total Casualties Announced Now 181,778
54 Dead, 2,331 Wounded in Today's List

The War Department gave out one casualty list today, which contained 2,385 names, bringing the total for the army to 176,785. No marine corps casualty list was issued, but the total previously reported for that arm of service was 4,993. The total for both army and marine corps so far announced is 181,778.

The army list today contained the names of 54 killed in action, 680 wounded severely, 543 wounded, degree undetermined, and 1,108 wounded slightly.

1,500 PUPILS TO USE FOOD MAN WILSON PORTABLE SCHOOLS GETS MOCK TRIAL

The location of forty portable one-room school buildings to be erected in Washington early in January was made public today by District school authorities.

About 1,500 children will be assigned to the various portable schools, which will house forty pupils each. The cost of the type of building purchased for Washington is \$3,250. The portable schools, which are in sections, are twenty-five feet wide by forty feet long and twenty feet high.

Each building has a complete heating and ventilation apparatus. The location of the buildings, which is subject to change, follows:
