4 LOVES HAD MRS. FLYNN, INCLUDING HER ENSIGN HUBBY

While pretty Lucienne Carroll Campbell Flynn, wife of Ensign Joseph A. Flynn, U. S. N. was writing "Pal o' Mine" love letters to Joseph Donner, Smithsonian Institution chemist, "just to pass the time away," she hesitated also between the loves of a husband on the high seas and two other sweethearts in the army.
