


# Expressions and Famous "Wilsonian Smiles" That Are Captivating Europe

(Continued from First Page.) You are conferring upon me as a representative of the great people for whom I speak. One who has been a student of history cannot accept honor of this sort without having his memory run back to the extraordi-

nary series of events which have centered in this place. "But as I have thought today I have been impressed by the contrast between the temporary and permanent things. Many political changes have centered about Rome, from the time when from a little city she grew to mistress of a great empire, and change after change has swept away many things, altering the very form of her affairs, but the thing that has remained permanent is the spirit of Rome and the Italian people.

Represent Freedom's Spirit. "That spirit seems to have caught with each age the characteristic purpose of the age. This imperial people

now gladly represents the freedom of nations. This people, which at one time seemed to conceive the purpose of governing the world, now takes part in the liberal enterprise of offering the world its own government. "Can there be a finer or more impressive illustration of the indestructible human spirit and of the unconquerable spirit of liberty? "I have been reflecting in these recent days about a colossal blunder which has been made—the blunder of force by the Central Empires. If Germany had waited a single generation she would have had a commercial empire of the world.

Rejoices in Partnership. "I have rejoiced personally in the partnership of the Italian and American people, but it is a new partnership in an old enterprise, an enter-

## President Says "Balance Of Power" Is Doomed, For It Won't Keep Its Balance

ROME, Jan. 4.—President Wilson delivered the following address in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday: "Your majesty and Mr. President of the Chamber:

"You are bestowing upon me an unprecedented honor, which I accept because I believe that it is extended to me as the representative of the great people for whom I speak. And I am going to take this first opportunity to say how entirely the heart of the American people has been with the great people of Italy.

"I am sure that you recognize the principles as I do—that it is not our privilege to say what sort of a government they should set up. But we are friends of those people, and it is our duty as their friends to see to it that some kind of protection is thrown around them, something supplied which will hold them together.

Most Organic Friendship. "There is only one thing that holds nations together, if you exclude force, and that is friendship, and by the same token the only thing that binds nations together is friendship. Therefore, our task at Paris is to organize the friendship of the world—to see to it that all the moral forces that make for right and justice and liberty are united and are given a vital organization to which the peoples of the world will readily and gladly respond.

"In other words, our task is no less colossal than this: To set up a new international psychology, to have a new real atmosphere. I am happy to say that in my dealings with the distinguished gentlemen who lead your nation, and those who lead France and England, I feel that atmosphere gathering, that desire to do justice, that desire to establish friendliness, that desire to make peace rest upon right, and with this common purpose no obstacles need be formidable.

Would Challenge Obstacles. "The only use of an obstacle is to be overcome. All that an obstacle does with brave men is to frighten them, but to challenge them. So that it ought to be our pride to overcome everything that stands in the way.

"We know that there cannot be another balance of power. That has been tried and found wanting for the best of all reasons—that it did not stay balanced inside itself, and a weight which does not hold together cannot constitute a makeweight in the affairs of men.

There must be something substituted for the balance of power, and I am happy to find everywhere in the air of these great nations the conception that that thing must be a thoroughly united league of nations. "What men once considered theoretical and idealistic turns out to be practical and necessary. We stand at the opening of a new age in which a new statesmanship will, I am confident, lift mankind to new levels of endeavor and achievement."

much touched by the generous terms of the address which you have just read," he said. "I feel it would be difficult for me to make a worthy reply, and yet if I could speak simply the things that are in my heart, I am sure they would constitute an adequate reply. I had occasion at the Parliament this afternoon to speak of the strong sympathy that had sprung up between the United States and Italy during the terrible years of the war, but perhaps here I could speak more intimately and say how sincerely the people of the United States had admired your own course and your own constant association with the armies of Italy, and the gracious and generous and serving association of her majesty, the Queen.

Made Citizen of Rome. A great throng packed the capitol last night when the citizenship of Rome was conferred upon the President. After the speeches by the King and the President, Queen Elena, attired in a gorgeous gown and wearing a jeweled crown, walked through the reception room, clinging to the President's arm. Between bows, in response to the salutations from every side, the Queen and the President chatted and appeared to be enjoying themselves. Mrs. Wilson wore a slimy dress of blue and gray embroidered with gold. Miss Margaret Wilson was attired in a light green gown.

When the Presidential party left the capitol there was a huge crowd massed outside, despite the lateness of the hour. They were nearly rushed off their feet by the cheering people, among whom were a number of soldiers. They drove back to the palace in closed carriages.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS, OR U. S. WILL BUILD GIANT NAVY, SAYS SEN. OWEN

BRITISH LABOR TO FIGHT FOR LEAGUE OF NATIONS  
LONDON, Jan. 4.—British labor today is resolved to fight for a league of nations. At a meeting of the labor party in Albert Hall, 5,000 delegates passed by practically unanimous vote a resolution congratulating President Wilson's efforts for the league and demanding that British delegates to the peace conference make establishment of the league one of their foremost points.

BELGIAN ENVOYS TO PEACE TABLE NAMED  
Belgium will be represented at the peace conference by Emile Vandervelde, minister of justice; Paul Hyams, minister of foreign affairs, and J. Van Den Heuvel, minister plenipotentiary to the Vatican, according to cables received by the Belgian official information service today.

READING MAY RETURN WITH THE PRESIDENT  
British Ambassador Reading probably will return to America with President Wilson, according to information reaching the State Department today. This fact is regarded as quite important, since it was reported when Lord Reading returned home several months ago that he and the President differed vastly on peace terms.

PRESIDENT IS INVITED BY CITY FATHERS OF DUBLIN  
LONDON, Jan. 4.—Dublin, Ireland, has voted the "freedom of the city" to President Wilson, and has appointed a deputation to wait on the American Executive, to invite him to visit the city.

CARRY RESIGNS POST ON U. S. SHIPPING BOARD  
Edward F. Carry resigned today as chairman of the ports and harbors commission of the United States Shipping Board. He will return to Chicago to resume the presidency of the Charles M. Schwab and others, was a dollar-a-year man. It was understood that his successor will be a permanent appointment at a reasonable salary.
