FAIR PRICE LISTS

Because of increased prices in foodstuffs in Washington, noticeably eggs and butter, the weekly fair price list of the District Food Administration may be required.

Clarence R. Wilson, local food chief, today announced that a strict watch is being maintained on the fluctuation of food prices in the District.

Several grocers and butchers have been ordered to appear before the District food administrator Wednesday to answer the charge of extorting excessive profits from the consumer.

Two hearings were held before the District food administration yesterday.

The fair price list was discontinued to give all District food dealers an opportunity to voluntarily comply with the reasonable price plan.

The food regulations provide for one year's imprisonment, or a \$1,000 fine or both for this particular infraction of the law.

Ten grocers were summoned from various parts of the city to explain their failure to observe the fair price list, since discontinued.

President Wilson's brief message of condolence to Mrs. Roosevelt was sent when his train, en route from Turin to Paris, stopped yesterday at the little mountain town of Modane, in Savoie, in the Arc, among the Alps. It is near the Franco-Italian border and is 3,500 feet above the sea.


