

TWO DISTRICT MEN CITED FOR BRAVERY

Two Washington men have been awarded Distinguished Service crosses for bravery overseas by General Pershing, in orders released today from the War Department. One was given to Capt. Henry E. Chandler, Sixth Regiment United States Marine Corps, for extraordinary heroism in action near Thibault, France, Sept. 15, 1918. Lieutenant Chandler fearlessly exposed himself to severe artillery and machine-gun fire and located machine-gun nests and sniper posts harassing his company and hindering its advance. When they had his platoon forward in the face of heavy fire and destroyed the nests.

Lieut. Col. Brehon B. Somerville, twenty-six years old, was graduated from Central High School in 1909 and from West Point in 1914. He is the son of Dr. and Mrs. William T. Somerville, of the Wardman Park Hotel. He went overseas in the Corps of Engineers, Eighty-ninth division. The War Department order in which he was cited for bravery, reads:

"Lieut. Col. Brehon Burke Somerville, Corps of Engineers, Eighty-ninth division. For extraordinary heroism in action near Poutilly, France, November 5-6, 1918. Voluntarily serving on the staff of the Eighty-ninth division, Lieutenant Colonel Somerville conducted the first engineering reconnaissance of the damaged bridge at Poutilly, advancing more than 500 meters beyond the American outposts, crossing three branches of the Meuse river, and successfully reconnoitering the enemy."

Total Casualties Announced Now 212,333; 370 Dead, 328 Wounded In Today's Lists

The War Department gave out two army casualty lists today, which contained 846 names, bringing the total for the army up to 206,808. No marine corps casualty list was issued, but the total previously reported for that arm of the service was 5,485. The total for both army and marine corps so far announced is now 212,333.

The army lists issued today contained the names of 89 killed in action, 103 died of wounds, 8 died from accident and other causes, 2 died from airplane accident, 168 died of disease, 323 wounded severely, 4 wounded to a degree undetermined, 1 wounded slightly, and 49 missing in action.

CAPTAIN SMITH MUSTERED INTO D. C. NATIONAL GUARD

Capt. Sydney Smith, commanding the National Capital Volunteer Guard, was mustered into the District national guard last night at the Armory, Fifth and L streets northwest. Two companies of 100 men each have already been organized. Equipment and uniforms have been issued to one and plans have been made for the outfitting of the other. Every effort will be made to bring the returning District guardsmen back into the Armory companies.

Plans for clubrooms have been completed. They will be at the Armory building, and will be reserved as a meeting center for overseas and loyal service men.

The statement was made that military service badges will be presented to the men who enlisted from the membership of the national guard. Approximately 12,000 of these have been ordered by the Board of Trade and the Retail Merchants and Manufacturers' Association.

NOTE SAYS FORMER CZAR STILL LIVES

ARCHANGEL, Jan. 8.—Information from several sources which appear to be reliable today lead many to believe that Nicholas Romanoff, former Czar of Russia, and his family are alive.

On November 18 last a letter was received by the Russian Grand Duke Cyril from the former Grand Duchess Tatiana, one of the former Czar's daughters, in which she said that the former empress and her daughters are alive and that the ex-Czar had not been shot.

When the Bolshevik ordered Nicholas shot, Count T— offered to lay down his life. Nicholas for a time objected, but finally consented. The ex-Czar then escaped.
