HUMPHREYS HUT OPENED BY JEWS

A cosy hut, with fireplaces, a reading room, a dancing floor, and an entertainment hall, is open today in the center of activities at Camp Humphreys, Va. It is the building dedicated and given to the camp yesterday by the Jewish Welfare Board.

Hundreds of Washingtonians visited the hut yesterday to inspect the latest addition to the camp, and were delighted by a program of entertainment, presided over by Judge Milton Strasburger.

Although the official dedication has just taken place, the hut itself has been in operation for some time. Architecturally, it is one of the most attractive spots in the camp, and the large gathering of soldiers at the exercises yesterday afternoon indicate it is one of the most popular.

Just before introducing Judge Strasburger yesterday afternoon, Dr. Samuel Gerson, in charge of the hut for the Jewish Welfare Board, related some of the uses to which the building has been and will be put for the benefit of all soldiers in the camp.

Dr. Maurice Harris, of New York, formally presented the hut to the camp in an impressive speech in which he outlined the great value to the American army of the spread of the "hut" idea in all camps.

Colonel Adams Replies. Col. L. Adams, acting as camp commander in the absence of Brig. Jay J. Morrow, accepted the hut on behalf of the camp, in a brief soldierly speech in which he laid stress upon the spiritual needs of men in uniform and the manner in which the Jewish Welfare Board had met the need.
