NAT GOODWIN DIES

Miss Gardner had been adopted by the veteran actor.

Mr. Goodwin's last public appearance on the stage was in Baltimore last Saturday night in "Why Marry?" Mr. Goodwin went to Philadelphia with the company, but was so ill that he continued on to New York from that city.

Goodwin was sixty-one years old, born in Boston in 1857. He was married five times. His latest wife, Marjorie Moreland, announced her own third marriage only a few days ago.

Goodwin's other wives were Miss Eliza Weatherby, who died in 1887; Miss Nellie Baker Pease, Miss Maxine Elliott, and Miss Edna Goodrich.

Goodwin made his debut as an actor in Boston, playing with Stuart Robinson in "The Law in New York" in 1878. He played comedy parts until 1879, when he went into Shakespearean productions and took the part of the grave digger in "Hamlet."

Goodwin's home was in Ocean Park, Cal., where he owned considerable property, but he spent a great part of his time in New York.

Goodwin's reputation as an actor was second to his fame as a matrimonial man. His five marriages often were commented on by him, and on one occasion he wrote:

"My first wife was an angel, my second a silly woman, my third a Roman senator, my fourth a pretty little thing, my fifth—all woman."

Some of his epigrams on the marital state have become famous. Here are a few of them:

"Marriages are made in heaven—and canceled in Reno."

"If a man steals your wife, don't kill him—caution him."

"My whole desire has been to prove by repetition that hope can conquer experience."

Total Casualties Announced Now 225,643; 108 Dead, 1,100 Wounded In Today's Lists.

The War Department gave out four army casualty lists today which contained 1,241 names bringing the total for the army up to 219,688. No marine corps casualty list was issued but the total previously reported for that arm of the service was 5,700. The total for both army and marine corps so far announced is now 225,643.

The army lists issued today contained the names of 32 killed in action, 84 died from wounds, 9 died from accident and other causes, 1 died from airplane accident, 42 died of disease, 296 wounded severely, 413 wounded to a degree undetermined, 331 wounded slightly, and 33 missing in action.
