Total Casualties Announced Now 227,270; 60 Dead, 1,564 Wounded in Today's Lists

The War Department gave out four army casualty lists today, which contained 1,627 names, bringing the total for the army up to 221,315. No marine corps casualty list was issued, but the total previously reported for that arm of the service was 5,700.

The army lists issued today contained the names of 18 killed in action, 16 died from wounds, 4 died from accident and other causes, 20 died of disease, 123 wounded severely, 579 wounded to a degree undetermined, 861 wounded slightly, and 3 missing in action.

AGREE ON BONUS FOR EX-SOLDIERS

A compromise amendment to pay bonuses to officers and men of the army and navy, as well as the marine corps, on their discharge has been agreed to by the revenue bill conferees.

The bonus for men amounts to \$50. Army and navy nurses will receive the same. Officers will get \$200.

The bonuses will be allowed those already discharged, as well as those honorably discharged later. Those who resign will likewise get the benefit.

It was decided to grant a flat rate in order to simplify administration. The conference report on the revenue bill is temporarily hung up because the House and Senate conferees have been unable to agree over the campaign contributions tax.

Congressmen Randall and Kahn of California withdrew their request for a separate vote on the "bone dry" amendment.

A separate vote on the child labor amendment also is withdrawn, as this amendment, like the "bone dry" amendment, remains in the bill.
