

# FARMERS PLAN TO UNITE WITH LABOR

CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—A plan to unite the nonpartisan league of farmers with organized labor in the large cities into a State and national political movement, with the aim of pulling the United States was discussed here yesterday at a conference between Gov. Lynn Frazier of North Dakota, representing the nonpartisan league; Duncan McDonald, president-elect of the Illinois Federation of Labor, and John Fitzpatrick, president of the Chicago Federation of Labor and candidate for mayor on the ticket of the recently organized labor party.

The conferees approved the idea and announced that they had made a national convention of representatives of both sides soon to take definite action.

Chicago labor leaders promised Governor Frazier assistance in the plan of the nonpartisan league to establish a State-owned bank in North Dakota. Transfer of several million dollars which the labor unions now have on deposit in Chicago banks to

the proposed State-owned financial institution was tentatively agreed to and the labor union representatives agreed to buy North Dakota bonds to be issued to carry out the nonpartisan league program if the banking interests carry out their alleged threat to boycott the securities.

Another plan discussed was to have the nonpartisan league ship a part of the produce of North Dakota farmers direct to union labor co-operative stores in Chicago so as to allow the producers to sell to the workmen without the commission dealers' profits.

A committee will be named in a few days to attempt to work out a co-operative organization to put the suggestion into operation.

**SAVE 20,000,000 BUSHELS.**

The final report of the threshing division of the United States Food Administration just submitted by Capt. Kenneth D. Hequembourg, who has had charge of the work, declares that various States estimate a saving by reason of the activities of this division of more than 20,000,000 bushels of wheat.

**EXPORT CONSERVATION LIST.**

The War Trade Board has issued a new export conservation list of commodities for which individual export licenses are required. Butter, cheese, eggs and egg products and milk, which have appeared on previous lists, have been eliminated from the new list, which is effective today.

# Total Casualties Announced Now 240,110; 116 Dead, 1,690 Wounded in Today's Lists

The War Department gave out four army casualty lists which contained 1,712 names, bringing the total for the army up to 234,155. No marine corps casualty list was issued, but the total previously reported for that arm of the service was 5,700. The total for both army and marine corps so far announced is now 240,110.

The army lists issued today contained the names of 31 killed in action, 15 died from wounds, 11 died from accident and other causes, 59 died of disease, 410 wounded severely, 563 wounded to a degree undetermined, 717 wounded slightly, and 6 missing in action.

Jewish residents of Washington have contributed to date \$19,000 to the Palestine Restoration Fund, Nathan Musher, chairman of the campaign committee in the District, announced today.

Additional names and committees will be organized tonight in the meeting room of the Y. M. H. A., Eleventh street and Pennsylvania avenue northwest.

"The appeal for funds to aid in the restoration of Palestine is being made along lines radically different from the usual plan," said Mr. Musher today. "With the enrolled membership of the Zionist organization of America as a nucleus, we plan to raise the needed amount in ways which will be free from the spectacular."

The three lines which followed this announcement were suppressed by the censorship.


