PRINCESS 'PAT' WILL MAKE 48 NIGHTIES'

LONDON, Feb. 14.—Princess Pat probably has a larger assortment of nighties than any British bride-to-be in recent years. In her trousseau there are forty-eight nightgowns. One dozen are made from fine white linen on classic lines. A square cut neck is bordered with the "key" pattern in hemstitching, and ribbons of pink, blue and pale yellow satin are threaded through the high waist and simple sleeves. There also are shell pink crystalline nightgowns, with flax lace and glorious sets of "nixon" and Valenciennes lawn and Paris lace. On each are flat satin bows. Then there is an exquisite rest gown of turquoise blue chiffon velvet, trimmed with gray squirrel. It has an underdress of accordion pleated blue chiffon, and a monk's hood over the shoulders.

Favorite Color Is Blue. Princess Pat's favorite color is blue, and that dominates the entire trousseau. An inspection of her wedding outfit shows that she loves rows and rows of tiny tucks, "fine linen," hemstitching, lots of lace, and those well-known transparent effects. The trousseau is extremely artistic, from the simple monogram designs to the graceful lines of all her garments, lingerie included. One of the very transparent petticoats is made of cream Valines lace and pink accordion pleated georgette. A silver tinsel ribbon with a flat bow is tied at the back of the waist-line. The entire trousseau is, of course, hand made.

No Boudoir Caps. The dressing gowns are of zennans silk, warm and dainty, blue and pink with white "bunny" fur trimming. Each has a little bed jacket to match with deep pockets. So far the princess has not chosen any boudoir caps, evidently planning not to conceal her exquisite tresses. One of her truly royal frocks is a silver and gold dancing gown. Straight silver brocade panels fall from the gold net sides and silver sleeves. There will be eight bridesmaids, three of them royal princesses, when the Princess Pat becomes the bride of Commander Ramsay. They are: Princess Mary, only daughter of King George; Princess Ingrid, niece of the Crown Prince and Princess of Sweden; Princess Maude of Fife, daughter of the Princess Royal; Lady Victoria Cambridge and Lady Helene Cambridge, daughters of the Marquis and Marchioness of Cambridge; Lady Ida and Lady Jane Ramsay, daughters of the Earl and Countess of Dalhousie, nieces of the bridegroom, and Lady May Cambridge, daughter of Brig. Gen. the Earl and Countess of Athlone.

URGE \$440 BONUS FOR 2,000 TEACHERS

Relief of the lower paid teachers in the public schools of Washington is provided for in an amendment which has been proposed to the District bill by Senator Penrose. It provides for an increase in pay of \$200 a year for teachers between the \$750 and \$1,000 grades. This increase is additional to the \$240 bonus provided by the legislative bill. The Penrose amendment would benefit 907 teachers who receive \$750, 498 who receive \$800, 150 who receive \$950, and 354 who receive \$1,000. In other words, it would benefit about 2,000 teachers. Its effect, taken in connection with the increase allowed in the legislative bill, would be to add \$440 a year to the basic pay of these teachers.

G. W. U. WANTS PICTURES OF ITS DISTINGUISHED SONS

All pictures should be sent in care of Eimer Louis Kayser, secretary of the university, 2101 G street northwest. The decorating of the assembly hall so as to make it a center of university life already has been started under direction of Dr. Collier. All of the portraits now in possession of the university have been hung and appropriately inscribed.

SENDS FALSE ALARM OF CHINESE KILLING

Police and detectives today are conducting a city-wide search for the person who last night sent in a false report to Police Headquarters stating that two Chinese had been murdered at Ninth and F streets northwest. A squad of detectives were rushed to the scene, but upon their arrival could find no trace of the "murdered" Chinese after a search in the Chinese restaurants and buildings in the vicinity. Government clerks on their way to their homes blocked traffic on both streets, and patrol wagons loaded with reserves from several precincts arrived on the scene. Police located the telephone from which the false report was flashed, and every effort is being made today to locate the practical joker.

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—A woman giving the name of Lotta Leskie was arraigned in the Kings County Court, Brooklyn, on a charge of having abducted Anna Watta, sixteen, from her home, 244 North Fifth street, Philadelphia. The woman pleaded not guilty and was remanded to jail for trial.
