methods, have produced antitoxins of extraordinary efficacy. "Our statesmen have discovered that the antidote of autocracy is the serum of liberty produced in the healthy body politic of democracy. It may be that for a disease even so subtle as Bolshevism, a remedial serum may be produced in a body as young and wholesome as that of our republic.

Diet of Golden Rule. "We are at least willing, as we cannot help ourselves, to submit to the inoculation of Bolshevistic bacteria with such a possibility. The vigorous health of this young giant of the North American continent is the result of a long continued diet of the Golden Rule. This is the meat on which this, our Caesar, has fed and by which he is made great. "By such an antitoxin, administered to Bolshevism, in Russia or in America, a cure may result. The remedy must be applied in absolute fairness and in fearless firmness. All lawlessness of every sort, masculine or feminine, must be met with a firm grip like that which throttled Bolshevism the other day in one of our cities on the Pacific Coast."

YANKEES IN RUSSIA EAGER TO RETURN

(Continued from First Page.) ungrateful, self-pitying, and with no ability to organize. "They are childish in the extreme. Russia is free from initiative. The entire country is menaced by unsanitary conditions. "We are all bitter against Bolshevism; we are willing and anxious to fight against this terrible scourge, but at the same time we have done our share and the men want to get home. "Everything is quiet at the front now. The severe cold is working havoc with the Bolsheviks, for they are ill-fed and ill-clad. In the vast majority of cases they are unwilling members of the Bolshevik army. "They would have our sympathy if they were decent, respectable people. But what are they? They are murderers, thieves; they are traitors to the workingman, the peasant, the decent home-loving element of Russia. They are typically treacherous, deceitful men who believe in neither God nor man, truth nor justice, honor nor integrity. They have brought Russia to the brink of the abyss and they threaten to push her over into the chasm."

TAX DODGERS TO GET FULL PENALTY

Tax dodgers will be given the full penalty provided by the law, according to a statement issued today by Daniel C. Roper, Commissioner of Internal Revenue. "Any person who deliberately conceals tax liability or who falsifies a return in order to reduce or evade any internal revenue tax, or who deliberately abets such concealment or fraud, finds arrayed against him the entire strength of the bureau pressing for the full civil and criminal penalties," said Mr. Roper. "This is the attitude of the Internal Revenue Bureau."

Dr. Simon Defends Jews. Taking exception to recent remarks of the Rev. George A. Simons that Jews are responsible for conditions in Russia, Dr. Abram Simon, at the Eighth Street Temple yesterday, said that he was not interested in the religion of Russian politicians or in whether Lenin was a Catholic or a Protestant, and that it was time for such remarks to cease. He said that he was confident that Herman Bernstein, the writer, when he appears before the Judiciary Committee of the House next week, will be able to dissolve the illusion that the Jews were in any way responsible for the chaotic condition of law and order in Russia. Applause greeted the announcement to the Secular League, at Pythian Temple yesterday, that "The Truth About Russia" would be the subject of an address at Poli's Theater next Sunday. It was said that speakers even more recently from Russia than those who spoke at the former meeting would talk. "Their Stamps bought for yourself or your children cultivate the right spirit."

RUSH YANKS HOME, SEN. OWEN URGES

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—"It is absolutely imperative that the American soldiers abroad return at once," said United States Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma, who returned today on the steamship Rotterdam, after studying financial conditions in England, France and Spain. "Brest is a horrible hole—not fit for cattle. "The first thing I am going to do when I reach Washington," Senator Owen added, "is to tell the Secretary of War of conditions at Brest and of how the men long to come home. I shall also take the matter up immediately with the Senate Committee on Military Affairs. I shall recommend that the men be brought back at once and that proper steps be taken to care for them here." "Commenting on conditions at Brest, Senator Owen added: "The climatic conditions there are bad. It rains or is misty almost every day. Officers of the army are doing their utmost, but the conditions are beyond them."

HE SAYS PINK WILL MAKE YOU HAPPY

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Kemp Prosser, the famous English color specialist, has been conducting some interesting experiments on health colors which he hopes the British government will adopt for decorating houses during the reconstruction period. He maintains that the adoption of his color schemes will make the British public both healthier and happier. Interviewed in his two "health rooms," one with walls of sunlight yellow, and the ceiling sky blue, with blue net curtains at the windows, Mr. Prosser declared that his purpose is to bring outdoors inside. "I am doing away with my pictures," he said. "Instead I am installing the bowls of sunlight against the background of the sunlight walls. These embroidered cushions on the chairs aid in carrying out my purpose with their flower designs." Then the color specialist led the way to the other room, in which the dominating color was apple-blossom pink. "This is the normal color," said Mr. Prosser, "because I have found that ninety-nine people out of a hundred are happiest in rooms of this shade."

WILLIAMS TESTIFIES IN HIS OWN DEFENSE

John Skelton Williams, Comptroller of the Currency, appeared today in his own defense before the Senate Committee on Banking and Currency. He testified in secret session, and Senators expected Williams to answer charges that he had speculated in stock and had relations with banks in Richmond, Va., and Baltimore. NEARING, PLEADING OWN CASE, DENIES DISLOYALTY

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Prof. Scott Nearing, accused of hindering conscription, pleaded his own case in Federal court here today. Addressing the jury, he declared that he had done no more than express his opinion on public questions and policies. He asserted the Government had failed to cite a single instance of him interfering with the draft. Regarding his article, "The Great Madness," which was alleged to be in violation of the espionage law, he said it was written eighteen months ago, and published in a perfectly open manner.

URGENT PARTIAL SUSPENSION OF CLAYTON ACT TILL 1920

Suspension of provision in the Clayton act regarding interlocking directorates involving common carriers until July 1, 1920, was recommended by the Senate Judiciary Committee today. This is recommended to keep short line railroads not under Government control on the same footing as the systems taken over.
