The War Department gave out one army casualty list today which contained 102 names, bringing the total for the army up to 254,410. A Marine Corps casualty list was issued which contained 40 names, bringing the total for that arm of service up to 5,814. The total for both army and Marine Corps so far announced is now 260,479.

ASK AID FOR U. S. BANK IN S. AMERICA

American business interests trading with South America have sought Government aid in setting up a bank to take over South American securities, it became known today. Proposals of a very definite nature have been made to Eugene Meyer, jr., managing director of the War Finance Corporation, for the creation of such an agency, it was stated officially. Officials of the War Finance Corporation say they can see no difficulty in the situation and have suggested legislation providing for such action to the House Ways and Means Committee.

Private Interests to Aid.

The plan would require between \$25,000,000 and \$50,000,000 from the War Finance Corporation. Private interests would aid in supplying a similar amount of funds so that all large operations in inter-American trade could be handled without difficulty, it was explained to the House committee.

Members of the House committee expressed the opinion that people of this country might not favor the Government engaging in what amounts to private banking. Meyer told them it was necessary to aid in re-establishing the foreign trade channels, and said he did not believe such action on the part of the Government could be construed as an operation in investments. It was merely an important reconstruction function, he said.

Plan Not Worked Out.

Meyer said that the corporation directors had come to no decision as to how the plan should be worked out. But he suggested the committee consider an amendment to the War Finance Corporation act which would give that body power to reach out a helping hand to export as well as domestic manufacturers.

HE LIVED OUT OF TOUCH WITH MANKING 40 YEARS

DENVER, Feb. 23.—Pagosa Springs (Col.), has grown used to tales of the man of mystery, who roamed the mountains leading a herd of two-score wild horses, but when the latter, dismaying to the first heavy snow, began running wild through this and other towns along the forest's edge, a United States deputy marshal was requested to round them up.

But one day, from an opening in the hillsides incredibly small, the wild man appeared, black, with white whiskers. He accompanied the marshal to the clearing, and there bade the officer leave him, promising that the horses would no longer trouble the towns. Within five hours every one had entered the forest.

For forty years the Mountain Man, William Hardwick, had lived out of touch with mankind, and for seventeen years he had not seen a human being, thereby escaping knowledge of the war.


