**U. S. TO TAKE OVER CAPE COD CANAL**

A bill to permit the Secretary of War to take immediate possession of the Cape Cod canal as soon as condemnation proceedings are properly instituted, was favorably reported to the Senate today by the Commerce Committee.

The bill appropriates \$10,000,000 for the improvement of the canal, with a view to maintaining a depth of twenty-five feet at mean low water, with suitable channel widths.

In a letter to Chairman Fletcher, the Secretary said the Railroad Administration was planning to relinquish control of the canal February 28, after having spent \$425,001 on improvements, while it was under Federal control.

"On account of this investment by the United States it is desirable that there be no lapse of Government control of this canal and that it should be taken over by the War Department upon its relinquishment by the Railroad Administration," Secretary Baker said.

**British Labor, Chaotic, Threatens to Overturn Whole Industrial System**

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Labor, in Great Britain is on the offensive, an offensive following several generations of deep-rooted discontent. The British Isles are honeycombed with industrial unrest, which, though quieted in one section one day, breaks out the next in another area.

The workmen are on the war path, determined to achieve and enforce a magna charta of living and working conditions—conditions which they now have come to regard as undeniable rights—for the third and lower middle classes.

This unrest, bubbling up from here-tofore suppressed wells of discontent, soon develops from requests to demands, and, though they may be dammed or diverted temporarily, continue bursting out unexpectedly, because fundamental, underlying causes are not remedied.

In so far as labor is concerned the United Kingdom was never in a more critical situation. Industry, now at tempting to convalesce from the war, is jeopardized by the upheaval. The position of the government, which made certain definite and glowing promises to the working classes just after the armistice, is imperiled to no slight degree, unless certain advantages are speedily assured the organized workers, they will not hesitate one moment in attempting to put the country into a chaotic state.

However, if the government proposes measures too advanced to suit the fancy of the conservative majority in parliament, the coalition government's power is thereby weakened.

**Labor is Handicapped.**

And labor, while supported by public opinion in reasonable demands, is handicapped by its just claims and regarding the possibilities of ameliorating unjust conditions by Bolshevik tendencies.

The "blunderbuss" of entrenched industrialism, half frightened by an archaic outcropping, stands ready in a half-hearted and belated manner to grant small concessions when there is no other way out, and these ad-

**DEMES TAUNT SENT QUENTIN TO DEATH**

ATLANTIC CITY, Feb. 25.—Ergodic denial of reports that Quentin Roosevelt was killed as the result of taunts that drove him to take the air, when he knew his eyesight was too poor for combat work, was made today at the Traymore by Capt. Alexander McLanahan, of Philadelphia, a friend of Lieutenant Roosevelt and a member of the aerial squad with which the former President's son was flying at the time he was killed by a German aviator.

"The published reports that Quentin Roosevelt was killed as the result of taunts of his associates, who reflected upon his valor, and that he went into the air to do battle despite the handicap of seriously defective vision, are absolutely unfounded," said Captain McLanahan. "On the contrary, Roosevelt had the entire confidence and esteem of all of his associates, and his bravery never was questioned for a moment. His sight may not have been perfect, but it certainly was good enough for effective fighting. He was killed in fair combat and fell as one of the fortunes of war."

"I knew Quentin Roosevelt very well and saw much of him. He was a real type of an American, but impulsive, perhaps, and full of nervous energy, which constantly impelled him to activity. He was especially popular with all of his associates. His sight was undoubtedly equal to the requirements of combat in the air."

"The day Roosevelt was killed, July 14, six of us went out on patrol over the German lines, near Chateau-Thierry. We penetrated a distance of about four miles. Others in the party included Lieutenant Roosevelt and myself were Lieutenant Curtis, of Rochester, N. Y.; Lieutenant Sewall, of Bath, Me.; Captain Mitchell, of Manchester, Mass.; and Captain Burdette, of Nashville, Tenn. We maneuvered our planes so that we had an advantage over six German planes."

"Each one of us singled out one of the six German planes. Roosevelt just happened to run up against a German flyer of unusual experience and ability."

**STATE HIGHWAYS HEADS TO MEET WITH HOUSTON**

Vigorous prosecution of road construction in various States, as soon as conditions permit, is expected to result from a conference to be held here on March 1 between Secretary Houston, of the Department of Agriculture, and a number of State highway commissioners. It was announced today.

These commissioners, now representing the Eastern section of the United States, are holding a meeting in New York. They are coming here to aid the department in speeding up the work, which will start as soon as the additional appropriation included in the postoffice bill becomes available.

Those from the Western section of the country will be heard later.

**APPROVE BIG ARMY.**

The War Department's recommendation for a temporary army of 538,498 officers and men after July 1, has been approved by the Senate Military Subcommittee and provisions for its maintenance have been written into the billion-dollar army appropriation measure. The subcommittee is taking the step yesterday also approved pay for enlisted men on the same basis as the war scale. This would mean a pay increase of about \$21,000,000.

**GREER VERDICT BY END OF THIS WEEK**

Judge Kathryn Sellers, of the Juvenile Court, will not hand down a decision in the strange case of the bakery children until late this week, it was announced today.

Eight orphan children, removed from the home of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Greer, 116 Twelfth street northeast, are involved in the proceedings. The police took the children from the Greers two months ago, when the Greers were made respondents in proceedings charging them with failing to provide a suitable home for destitute children.

The children in question had been working in a bakery operated by Mrs. Greer.

Seventy-five witnesses offered evidence in the inquisition, which continued one month. The testimony covered 2,500 pages.

After the court determines whether they may keep the children there remains another case against the Greers. They are charged with violating the child labor law of the District of Columbia. No date has been fixed for a hearing of this case.

Mrs. Greer, while testifying in her own behalf, declared she never again would have orphaned a child in her bakery.

Should the court decide adversely to the Greers in the case just ended, no penalty is attached. It merely involves permanent removal of the children.

**Mann Claims 130 Votes, Gillett, 140; There Are 239 G.O.P. Congressmen**

Apparently, there are thirty-one more Republican votes in the House than had been estimated.

At least this is the conclusion reached by Congressman Madden, campaign manager for Congressman James H. Mann of Illinois, in the speakership contest. Supporters of Congressman Frederick H. Gillett of Massachusetts, declare they have 140 votes. The Mann forces declare they have 130. That makes a total of 270. There are only 239 known Republicans in the next Congress.

"Where do they come from?" asked Madden. "We are not out of the race, but will stay to the end."

The speakership is to be settled at a Republican caucus Thursday.

**MAN THOUGHT DEAD THIRTY YEARS APPEARS**

CAMBRIDGE, Ohio, Feb. 25.—Believed killed in an oil well accident in West Virginia thirty years ago, F. A. Davis, aged fifty-six, appeared at the home of his sister, Mrs. Samuel Whisler, here recently and announced himself. He had suffered a lapse of memory following the accident in which he was injured.

**NEW IRISH POLICY ALMOST UTOPIAN**

DUBLIN, Feb. 25.—Ireland will benefit equally with Great Britain in the reconstruction work planned by the government, Sir James MacPherson, chief secretary for Ireland, declared in outlining the government's Irish policy before the conference of representatives of Irish municipal associations here.

"A grant of 250,000 pounds (\$1,250,000) has already been made to meet the immediate needs of demobilized men and other assistance," said MacPherson.

"Any scheme for reconstruction advanced in Great Britain is applicable to Ireland. The housing situation in Ireland is appalling. The government will continue its housing program, including subsidies for payment of the difference between 'economic rent' and the rent which tenants are able to pay. We are considering the formation of a housing department."

"Ireland will participate in the benefits of the ministry of health, medical inspection in the schools, reclamation, and light and transit projects which are contemplated. The salaries of school teachers will be taken up. The principle of proportionate representation will be applied to local elections."
